H.B. No. 2833

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

relating to the licensing and regulation of certain private security services.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Section 1702.004, Occupations Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1702.004. GENERAL SCOPE OF REGULATION. (a) The board [~~commission~~], in addition to performing duties required by other law or exercising powers granted by other law:

(1) licenses investigations companies and security services contractors;

(2) issues commissions to certain security officers;

(3) issues authorizations to certain security officers engaged in the personal protection of individuals;

(4) registers:

(A) certain individuals connected with a license holder; and

(B) certain individuals employed in a field connected to private investigation or private security; and

(5) regulates license holders, security officers, and registrants under this chapter.

(b) Chapter 53 does not apply to this chapter or to any licensing, regulatory, or disciplinary determinations made under this chapter.

1 SECTION 2. Subchapter E, Chapter 1702, Occupations Code, is
2 amended by adding Section 1702.085 to read as follows:

3 Sec. 1702.085. CONFIDENTIALITY OF RECORDS. Records
4 maintained by the department under this chapter on the home
5 address, home telephone number, driver's license number, or social
6 security number of an applicant or a license holder, registrant, or
7 security officer commission holder are confidential and are not
8 subject to mandatory disclosure under Chapter 552, Government Code.

9 SECTION 3. Section 1702.102(a), Occupations Code, is
10 amended to read as follows:

11 (a) Unless the person holds a license as a security services
12 contractor, a person may not:

13 (1) act as an alarm systems company, armored car
14 company, courier company, guard company, ~~or~~ guard dog company,
15 locksmith company, or private security consultant company;

16 (2) offer to perform the services of a company in
17 Subdivision (1); or

18 (3) engage in business activity for which a license is
19 required under this chapter.

20 SECTION 4. Section 1702.104, Occupations Code, is amended
21 to read as follows:

22 Sec. 1702.104. INVESTIGATIONS COMPANY. (a) A person acts
23 as an investigations company for the purposes of this chapter if the
24 person:

25 (1) engages in the business of obtaining or
26 furnishing, or accepts employment to obtain or furnish, information
27 related to:

1 (A) crime or wrongs done or threatened against a
2 state or the United States;

3 (B) the identity, habits, business, occupation,
4 knowledge, efficiency, loyalty, movement, location, affiliations,
5 associations, transactions, acts, reputation, or character of a
6 person;

7 (C) the location, disposition, or recovery of
8 lost or stolen property; or

9 (D) the cause or responsibility for a fire,
10 libel, loss, accident, damage, or injury to a person or to property;

11 (2) engages in the business of securing, or accepts
12 employment to secure, evidence for use before a court, board,
13 officer, or investigating committee;

14 (3) engages in the business of securing, or accepts
15 employment to secure, the electronic tracking of the location of an
16 individual or motor vehicle other than for criminal justice
17 purposes by or on behalf of a governmental entity; or

18 (4) engages in the business of protecting, or accepts
19 employment to protect, an individual from bodily harm through the
20 use of a personal protection officer.

21 (b) For purposes of Subsection (a)(1), obtaining or
22 furnishing information includes information obtained or furnished
23 through the review and analysis of, and the investigation into the
24 content of, computer-based data not available to the public.

25 SECTION 5. Section 1702.113, Occupations Code, is amended
26 to read as follows:

27 Sec. 1702.113. GENERAL QUALIFICATIONS FOR LICENSE,

1 CERTIFICATE OF REGISTRATION, OR SECURITY OFFICER COMMISSION. (a)

2 An applicant for a license, certificate of registration, or
3 security officer commission or the applicant's manager must be at
4 least 18 years of age and must not:

5 (1) have been convicted in any jurisdiction of two or
6 more felony offenses [~~a Class A misdemeanor or equivalent offense~~
7 ~~or a greater offense~~], unless [~~a~~] full pardons have [~~pardon has~~]
8 been granted for all convictions for reasons relating to [~~a~~]
9 wrongful convictions [~~conviction~~];

10 (2) have been convicted in any jurisdiction of any of
11 the following:

12 (A) a single felony or equivalent offense for
13 which the 20th anniversary of the date of conviction has not
14 occurred before the date of application, unless a full pardon has
15 been granted for reasons relating to a wrongful conviction; or

16 (B) a Class A misdemeanor or equivalent offense
17 for which the 10th anniversary of the date of conviction has not
18 occurred before the date of application, unless a full pardon has
19 been granted for reasons relating to a wrongful conviction;

20 (3) at the time of application be charged with the
21 commission of a Class A misdemeanor or felony offense, under an
22 information or indictment;

23 (4) have not, in the 10 years preceding the date of
24 application, been adjudicated as having engaged in delinquent
25 conduct violating a penal law of the grade of felony;

26 (5) [~~a Class B misdemeanor or equivalent offense for~~
27 ~~which the fifth anniversary of the date of conviction has not~~

1 ~~occurred before the date of application, unless a full pardon has~~
2 ~~been granted for reasons relating to a wrongful conviction,~~

3 [~~3~~] have been found by a court to be incompetent by
4 reason of a mental defect or disease and not have been restored to
5 competency;

6 (6) [~~4~~ be suffering from habitual drunkenness or
7 from narcotics addiction or dependence, or

8 [~~5~~] have been dishonorably discharged from the
9 United States armed services, discharged from the United States
10 armed services under other [~~than honorable~~] conditions determined
11 by the board to be prohibitive, or dismissed from the United States
12 armed services if a commissioned officer in the United States armed
13 services; or

14 (7) be required to register in this or any other state
15 as a sex offender, unless the applicant is approved by the board
16 under Section 1702.3615.

17 (b) An applicant is ineligible [~~The commission may deny an~~
18 ~~application~~] for a license, certificate of registration, or
19 commission if the applicant has charges pending for or has been
20 convicted in any jurisdiction of a Class B misdemeanor for an [~~or~~
21 ~~equivalent~~] offense determined by the board to be disqualifying if
22 the fifth anniversary of the date of conviction has not occurred
23 before the date of application, unless a full pardon has been
24 granted for reasons relating to a wrongful conviction.

25 (c) For purposes of this section, an offense under the laws
26 of this state, another state, or the United States is considered:

27 (1) a felony if the offense:

1 (A) at the time of conviction was designated by a
2 law of this state as a felony, including a state jail felony;

3 (B) contains all the elements of an offense
4 designated by a law of this state as a felony, including a state
5 jail felony; or

6 (C) is punishable by confinement for one year or
7 more in a penitentiary;

8 (2) a Class A misdemeanor if the offense is not a
9 felony and the offense:

10 (A) at the time of conviction was designated by a
11 law of this state as a Class A misdemeanor;

12 (B) contains all the elements of an offense
13 designated by a law of this state as a Class A misdemeanor; or

14 (C) confinement in a jail other than a state jail
15 felony facility is set as a possible punishment; or

16 (3) a Class B misdemeanor if the offense is not a
17 felony or Class A misdemeanor and the offense:

18 (A) at the time of conviction was designated by a
19 law of this state as a Class B misdemeanor;

20 (B) contains all the elements of an offense
21 designated by a law of this state as a Class B misdemeanor; or

22 (C) confinement in a jail other than a state jail
23 felony facility is set as a possible punishment.

24 (d) For purposes of this section, "convicted" has the
25 meaning provided in Section 1702.371.

26 (e) An individual's eligibility under this chapter is not
27 affected by any relationship or lack of relationship between the

1 nature of the criminal charges or conviction and the regulated
2 occupation.

3 SECTION 6. Section 1702.119(b), Occupations Code, is
4 amended to read as follows:

5 (b) An individual may not act as a manager until the
6 individual has:

7 (1) demonstrated the individual's qualifications by
8 passing the written examination required by Section 1702.117(a);
9 and

10 (2) made a satisfactory showing to the department
11 ~~[commission]~~ that the individual:

12 (A) satisfies the requirements of Section
13 1702.113 and meets all qualification and experience requirements
14 set by rule for a manager of the type of company for which the
15 individual is applying ~~[either Section 1702.114 or Section~~
16 ~~1702.115, as appropriate]; and~~

17 (B) has not engaged in conduct regarding a
18 violation or conviction that is grounds for disciplinary action
19 under Section 1702.361(b) or 1702.3615(a).

20 SECTION 7. Sections 1702.124(a), (b), and (e), Occupations
21 Code, are amended to read as follows:

22 (a) An applicant is not eligible for ~~[The commission may not~~
23 ~~issue]~~ a license unless the applicant provides as part of the
24 application ~~[files with the commission]:~~

25 (1) a certificate of insurance or other documentary
26 evidence of a general liability insurance policy ~~[on a certificate~~
27 ~~of insurance form prescribed by the Texas Department of Insurance~~

1 ~~and~~ countersigned by an insurance agent licensed in this state; or

2 (2) a certificate of insurance for surplus lines
3 coverage obtained under Chapter 981, Insurance Code, through a
4 licensed Texas surplus lines agent resident in this state.

5 (b) The general liability insurance policy must be
6 conditioned to pay on behalf of the license holder damages that the
7 license holder becomes legally obligated to pay because of bodily
8 injury, property damage, or personal injury, caused by an event
9 involving the principal, or an officer, agent, or employee of the
10 principal, in the conduct of any activity or service for which the
11 license holder is [business] licensed under this chapter.

12 (e) An insurance certificate executed and filed with the
13 department [commission] under this chapter remains in effect until
14 the insurer terminates future liability by providing to the
15 department [commission] at least 10 days' notice of the intent to
16 terminate liability.

17 SECTION 8. Section 1702.133(b), Occupations Code, is
18 amended to read as follows:

19 (b) A license holder or an officer, director, partner, or
20 manager of a license holder shall disclose to a law enforcement
21 officer or a district attorney, or that individual's
22 representative, information the person obtains that relates to a
23 criminal offense. A private investigator who is working under the
24 direct supervision of a licensed attorney satisfies this
25 requirement by disclosing the information to the supervising
26 attorney.

27 SECTION 9. Section 1702.163, Occupations Code, is amended

1 to read as follows:

2 Sec. 1702.163. QUALIFICATIONS FOR SECURITY OFFICER
3 COMMISSION. (a) An applicant employed by a license holder is not
4 eligible for [~~The board may not issue~~] a security officer
5 commission [~~to an applicant employed by a license holder~~] unless
6 the applicant submits as part of the application [~~evidence~~]
7 satisfactory evidence [~~to the board~~] that the applicant has:

8 (1) completed the basic training course at a school or
9 under an instructor approved by the board;

10 (2) met each qualification established by this chapter
11 and administrative [~~board~~] rule;

12 (3) achieved the score required by the board on the
13 examination under Section 1702.1685; and

14 (4) demonstrated to the satisfaction of the firearm
15 training instructor that the applicant has complied with other
16 board standards for minimum marksmanship competency with a handgun.

17 (b) An individual is not eligible for [~~The commission may~~
18 ~~not issue~~] a security officer commission if the [~~to an~~] individual
19 [~~who~~]:

20 (1) is disqualified by state or federal law from
21 owning or possessing a firearm [~~younger than 18 years of age~~];

22 (2) is incapable of exercising sound judgment in the
23 proper use and storage of a handgun [~~a convicted felon~~]; [~~or~~]

24 (3) is a fugitive from justice for a felony or a Class
25 A or Class B misdemeanor;

26 (4) is a chemically dependent person; or

27 (5) is currently restricted under a court protective

1 order or subject to a restraining order affecting the spousal
2 relationship, other than a restraining order solely affecting
3 property interests [~~has committed an act that, if committed by a~~
4 ~~license holder, would be grounds for suspension or revocation of a~~
5 ~~license~~].

6 (c) An individual who has been convicted twice in the
7 10-year period preceding the date on which the person applies for a
8 security officer commission of an offense of the grade of Class B
9 misdemeanor or greater that involves the use of alcohol or a
10 controlled substance as a statutory element of the offense is a
11 chemically dependent person for purposes of this section and is not
12 qualified to receive a security officer commission under this
13 subchapter. This subsection does not preclude the disqualification
14 of an individual for being a chemically dependent person if other
15 evidence exists to demonstrate that the person is a chemically
16 dependent person.

17 (d) For purposes of Subsection (b)(2), a person is incapable
18 of exercising sound judgment with respect to the proper use and
19 storage of a handgun if the person:

20 (1) has been diagnosed by a licensed physician as
21 suffering from a psychiatric disorder or condition that causes or
22 is likely to cause substantial impairment in judgment, mood,
23 perception, impulse control, or intellectual ability;

24 (2) suffers from a psychiatric disorder or condition
25 described by Subsection (d)(1) that:

26 (A) is in remission but is reasonably likely to
27 redevelop at a future time; or

1 (B) requires continuous medical treatment to
2 avoid redevelopment;

3 (3) has been diagnosed by a licensed physician or
4 declared by a court as incompetent to manage the person's own
5 affairs; or

6 (4) has entered a plea of not guilty by reason of
7 insanity in a criminal proceeding.

8 (e) The following constitutes evidence that a person has a
9 psychiatric disorder or condition described by Subsection (d)(1):

10 (1) involuntary psychiatric hospitalization in the
11 five years preceding the date of the application;

12 (2) psychiatric hospitalization in the two years
13 preceding the date of the application;

14 (3) inpatient or residential substance abuse
15 treatment in the five years preceding the date of the application;

16 (4) diagnosis in the five years preceding the date of
17 the application by a licensed physician that the person is
18 dependent on alcohol, a controlled substance, or a similar
19 substance; or

20 (5) diagnosis at any time by a licensed physician that
21 the person suffers or has suffered from a psychiatric disorder or
22 condition consisting of or relating to:

23 (A) schizophrenia or delusional disorder;

24 (B) bipolar disorder;

25 (C) chronic dementia, whether caused by illness,
26 brain defect, or brain injury;

27 (D) dissociative identity disorder;

1 (E) intermittent explosive disorder; or

2 (F) antisocial personality disorder.

3 (f) Notwithstanding Subsection (d), a person who has
4 previously been diagnosed as suffering from a psychiatric disorder
5 or condition described by Subsection (d) or listed in Subsection
6 (e) is not because of that disorder or condition incapable of
7 exercising sound judgment with respect to the proper use and
8 storage of a handgun if the person provides the department with a
9 certificate from a licensed physician whose primary practice is in
10 the field of psychiatry stating that the psychiatric disorder or
11 condition is in remission and is not reasonably likely to develop at
12 a future time.

13 (g) An individual's eligibility under this section is not
14 affected by a relationship or lack of relationship between the
15 nature of a criminal charge or conviction and the regulated
16 occupation.

17 SECTION 10. Section 1702.221, Occupations Code, is amended
18 to read as follows:

19 Sec. 1702.221. REGISTRATION REQUIRED. (a) An individual
20 must register in accordance with the requirements of this chapter
21 and related administrative rules [~~with the commission as provided~~
22 ~~by commission rule~~] if the individual:

23 (1) is employed as an alarm systems installer, alarm
24 systems monitor, electronic access control device installer,
25 locksmith, dog trainer, manager or branch office manager,
26 noncommissioned security officer, private investigator, private
27 security consultant, or security salesperson; or

1 (2) is an owner, officer, partner, or shareholder of a
2 license holder.

3 (b) Registration under this chapter does not preclude an
4 individual from performing additional duties or services
5 authorized by the individual's employer that are not regulated by
6 this chapter.

7 SECTION 11. Section 1702.226, Occupations Code, is
8 transferred to Subchapter F, Chapter 1702, Occupations Code,
9 redesignated as Section 1702.1045, and amended to read as follows:

10 Sec. 1702.1045 [~~1702.226~~]. PRIVATE SECURITY CONSULTING
11 COMPANY [~~CONSULTANT~~]. A person [~~An individual~~] acts as a private
12 security consulting company [~~consultant~~] for purposes of this
13 chapter if the person [~~individual~~]:

14 (1) consults, advises, trains, or specifies or
15 recommends products, services, methods, or procedures in the
16 security or loss prevention industry;

17 (2) provides a service described by Subdivision (1) on
18 an independent basis and without being affiliated with a particular
19 service or product; and

20 (3) meets the experience requirements established by
21 the board [~~commission~~].

22 SECTION 12. Section 1702.229, Occupations Code, is amended
23 to read as follows:

24 Sec. 1702.229. QUALIFICATIONS FOR REGISTRATION. (a) An
25 applicant for registration [~~individual~~] must meet the
26 qualifications required under Section 1702.113 for a license
27 applicant [~~be at least 18 years of age to be registered~~].

1 (b) In accordance with the requirements of Section
2 1702.0611, the board [~~The commission~~] by rule may adopt additional
3 qualifications for an individual to be registered under this
4 subchapter.

5 SECTION 13. Section 1702.282, Occupations Code, is amended
6 by amending Subsections (b) and (c) and adding Subsection (e) to
7 read as follows:

8 (b) Before beginning employment as a commissioned security
9 officer, the applicant must be approved by the board [~~commission~~]
10 based on the results of the check under Subsection (a). To continue
11 employment in a capacity regulated under this chapter other than as
12 a commissioned security officer, the applicant must be approved by
13 the board [~~commission~~] based on the results of the check under
14 Subsection (a) not later than the 120th day after the date the
15 applicant begins employment in that capacity.

16 (c) A license, registration, security officer commission,
17 letter of approval, permit, or certification issued by the board
18 [~~commission~~] is conditional on the board's [~~commission's~~] receipt
19 of criminal history record information.

20 (e) On receipt of notice that a check of the applicant's
21 criminal record has uncovered an unresolved and potentially
22 disqualifying arrest that occurred before the 10th anniversary of
23 the date the application is filed, the applicant must provide a
24 letter of reference from the county sheriff, prosecuting attorney,
25 or judge of the county in which the applicant was arrested stating
26 that a record of a disposition related to the arrest does not exist,
27 and to the best of the county sheriff's, prosecuting attorney's, or

1 judge's knowledge the applicant is free of any disqualifying
2 convictions. If the applicant fails to provide either the letter of
3 reference or documentary proof of the final disposition of the
4 arrest, the application is considered incomplete and the applicant
5 may not be issued a license, commission, or certificate of
6 registration under this chapter.

7 SECTION 14. Section 1702.284, Occupations Code, is amended
8 to read as follows:

9 Sec. 1702.284. ALARM SYSTEMS RECORDS CONFIDENTIAL.
10 Information contained in alarm systems records maintained by a
11 governmental body that concerns the location of an alarm system,
12 the name of the occupant of an alarm system location, or the type of
13 alarm system used is confidential and may be disclosed only to the
14 board, to the alarm company to which the confidential records
15 relate, [~~commission~~] or as otherwise required by state law or court
16 order.

17 SECTION 15. Sections 1702.323(c) and (d), Occupations Code,
18 are amended to read as follows:

19 (c) The security department of a private business may not
20 hire or employ an individual to perform a duty described by Section
21 1702.222 if the individual has been convicted of a crime that would
22 otherwise preclude the individual from being registered under this
23 chapter. Although the security department of a private business
24 that hires or employs an individual as a private security officer to
25 possess a firearm in the course and scope of the individual's duties
26 is required to apply for a security officer commission for the
27 individual under this chapter, the security department of a private

1 business is not required to apply to the board [~~commission~~] for any
2 license under this chapter.

3 (d) This chapter applies to an individual described by
4 Subsection (a) who in the course of employment:

5 (1) comes into contact with the public;

6 (2) wears:

7 (A) a uniform [~~with any type of badge~~] commonly
8 associated with security personnel or law enforcement;

9 (B) any type of badge commonly associated with
10 security personnel or law enforcement; or

11 (C) a patch or apparel containing the word [~~with~~]
12 "security" or a substantially similar word that is intended to or is
13 likely to create the impression that the individual is performing
14 security services [~~on the patch or apparel~~]; and

15 (3) performs a duty described by Section 1702.108 or
16 1702.222.

17 SECTION 16. Section 1702.324, Occupations Code, as amended
18 by Chapters 518, 728, 1102, and 1155, Acts of the 79th Legislature,
19 Regular Session, 2005, is amended by reenacting and amending
20 Subsection (b) and adding Subsection (c) to read as follows:

21 (b) This chapter does not apply to:

22 (1) a manufacturer or a manufacturer's authorized
23 distributor while selling [~~who sells~~] equipment intended for resale
24 [~~and does not perform any other service that requires a license~~
25 ~~under this chapter~~];

26 (2) a person engaged exclusively in the business of
27 obtaining and providing information to:

1 (A) determine creditworthiness;

2 (B) collect debts; or

3 (C) ascertain the reliability of information
4 provided by an applicant for property, life, or disability
5 insurance or an indemnity or surety bond;

6 (3) a person engaged exclusively in the business of
7 repossessing property that is secured by a mortgage or other
8 security interest;

9 (4) a person who[+]

10 [~~(A)~~] is engaged in the business of psychological
11 testing or other testing and interviewing services, including
12 services to determine attitudes, honesty, intelligence,
13 personality, and skills, for preemployment purposes[+and

14 [~~(B) does not perform any other service that~~
15 ~~requires a license under this chapter~~];

16 (5) a person who:

17 (A) is engaged in obtaining information that is a
18 public record under Chapter 552, Government Code, regardless of
19 whether the person receives compensation;

20 (B) is not a full-time employee, as defined by
21 Section 61.001, Labor Code, of a person licensed under this
22 chapter; and

23 (C) does not perform any other act that requires
24 a license under this chapter;

25 (6) a licensed engineer practicing engineering or
26 directly supervising engineering practice under Chapter 1001,
27 including forensic analysis, burglar alarm system engineering, and

1 necessary data collection;

2 (7) an employee of a cattle association who inspects
3 livestock brands under the authority granted to the cattle
4 association by the Grain Inspection, Packers and Stockyards
5 Administration of the United States Department of Agriculture;

6 (8) a landman performing activities in the course and
7 scope of the landman's business;

8 (9) an attorney while engaged in the practice of law;

9 (10) a person who obtains a document for use in
10 litigation under an authorization or subpoena issued for a written
11 or oral deposition;

12 (11) an admitted insurer, insurance adjuster, agent,
13 or insurance broker licensed by the state, performing duties in
14 connection with insurance transacted by that person;

15 (12) a person who on the person's own property or on
16 property owned or managed by the person's employer:

17 (A) installs, changes, or repairs a mechanical
18 security device;

19 (B) repairs an electronic security device; or

20 (C) cuts or makes a key for a security device;

21 (13) security personnel, including security contract
22 personnel, working at a commercial nuclear power plant licensed by
23 the United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission;

24 (14) a person or firm licensed as an accountant or
25 accounting firm under Chapter 901, an owner of an accounting firm,
26 or an employee of an accountant or accounting firm while performing
27 services regulated under Chapter 901; or

1 (15) a retailer, wholesaler, or other person who sells
2 mechanical security devices, including locks and deadbolts, but who
3 does not:

4 (A) service mechanical security devices for the
5 public outside of the person's premises; or

6 (B) claim to act as a locksmith.

7 (c) The exemptions provided by Subsection (b) apply only to
8 a person described in that subsection while the person is
9 performing services directly related to and dependent on the
10 provision of the exempted service that does not otherwise require
11 licensing under this chapter. The exemptions do not apply to
12 activities or services that are independent of the service or
13 profession that is the basis for the exemption.

14 SECTION 17. Section 1702.361, Occupations Code, is amended
15 to read as follows:

16 Sec. 1702.361. DENIAL AND DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS [~~POWERS OF~~
17 ~~COMMISSION~~]; GROUNDS. (a) Subject to the board's final order under
18 the hearing provisions of this subchapter [~~Except as provided by~~
19 ~~Section 1702.3615~~], the department [~~commission~~], for conduct
20 described by Subsection (b), may:

21 (1) deny an application or revoke, suspend, or refuse
22 to renew a license, registration, or security officer commission;

23 (2) reprimand a license holder, registrant, or
24 commissioned security officer; or

25 (3) place on probation a person whose license,
26 registration, or security officer commission has been suspended.

27 (b) The department [~~commission~~] shall take disciplinary

1 action described by Subsection (a) on proof:

2 (1) that the applicant, license holder, registrant, or
3 commissioned security officer has:

4 (A) violated this chapter or a [~~commission~~] rule
5 adopted under this chapter;

6 (B) become ineligible for licensure or
7 registration under Section 1702.113, or a commission under Section
8 1702.163, if applicable, other than an action for which the
9 department has taken summary action under Section 1702.364 [~~been~~
10 ~~convicted of a Class B misdemeanor or equivalent offense if the~~
11 ~~fifth anniversary of the date of the conviction has occurred~~];

12 (C) engaged in fraud, deceit, or
13 misrepresentation; [~~or~~]

14 (D) made a material misstatement in an

(2) the number of agency positions described by Subsection (a)(2) filled as of January 1 of the year the report is due;

(3) the percentage of the money received by the agency under Subsection (a) pursuant to the allocation made by the comptroller on or before March 1 of the year preceding the year in which the report is due that was used by the agency before the date of the allocation made by the comptroller under Subsection (a) on or before March 1 of the year the report is due;

(4) the number of training hours received during the 12-month or approximately 12-month period described by Subdivision (3) that were funded by money received by the agency pursuant to the allocation made by the comptroller

on or before March 1 of the year preceding the year in which the report is due; and

(5) that the agency has complied with the requirements of this section regarding the use of any money received by the agency pursuant to the allocation made by the comptroller on or before March 1 of the year preceding the year in which the report is due.
