#### A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT relating to the foundation curriculum, the establishment of the 2 instructional materials allotment, and the adoption, review, and 3 purchase of instructional materials and technological equipment 4 for public schools. 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 6 7 SECTION 1. Subdivision (28), Subsection (b), Section 7.055, 8 Education Code, is amended to read as follows: The commissioner shall perform duties relating to 9 (28) 10 the funding, adoption, and purchase of instructional materials 11 [textbooks] under Chapter 31. SECTION 2. Subsection (f), Section 7.056, Education Code, 12 13 is amended to read as follows: (f) A school district or campus that is required to develop 14 and implement a student achievement improvement plan under Section 15 39.102 or 39.103 may receive an exemption or waiver under this 16 section from any law or rule other than: 17 18 (1) a prohibition on conduct that constitutes a criminal offense; 19 (2) a requirement imposed by federal law or rule; 20 21 (3) requirement, restriction, or а prohibition 22 imposed by state law or rule relating to: 23 (A) public school accountability as provided by 24 Subchapters B, C, D, E, and J, Chapter 39; or

(B) educator rights and benefits under
 Subchapters A, C, D, E, F, G, and I, Chapter 21, or under Subchapter
 A, Chapter 22; or

4 (4) [textbook] selection of instructional materials
5 under Chapter 31.

SECTION 3. Subdivision (23), Subsection (c), Section 7.102,
Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

8 (23) The board shall adopt and purchase or license 9 <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] as provided by Chapter 31 and 10 adopt rules required by that chapter.

SECTION 4. Subsections (a) and (c), Section 7.108, 2 Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

(a) A person interested in selling bonds of any type or a person engaged in manufacturing, shipping, selling, or advertising <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] or otherwise connected with the <u>instructional material</u> [textbook] business commits an offense if the person makes or authorizes a political contribution to or takes part in, directly or indirectly, the campaign of any person seeking election to or serving on the board.

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(c) In this section:

21 (1) <u>"Instructional material" has the meaning assigned</u>
22 by Section 31.002.

(2) "Political contribution" has the meaning assigned
 by Section 251.001, Election Code.

25 [(2) "Textbook" has the meaning assigned by Section 26 31.002.]

REPRESENTATION OF [TEXTBOOK] 2 PUBLISHER OF INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS BY FORMER MEMBER OF BOARD. 3 SECTION 6. 4 Subsection (a), Section 7.112, Education Code, is amended to read as follows: 5 (a) A former member of the State Board of Education who is 6 7 employed by or otherwise receives compensation from a [textbook] publisher of instructional materials may not, before the second 8 9 anniversary of the date on which the person last served as a member of the State Board of Education: 10 confer with a member of the board of trustees of a 11 (1)school district concerning instructional materials [a textbook] 12 13 published by that [textbook] publisher; or appear at a meeting of the board of trustees on 14 (2) 15 behalf of the [textbook] publisher. 16 SECTION 7. Subdivision (2), Subsection (c), Section 7.112, 17 Education Code, is amended to read as follows: <u>"Instructional mate</u>rial" and 18 (2) "publisher" ["Publisher" and "textbook"] have the meanings assigned by Section 19 31.002. 20 SECTION 8. Subsection (b), Section 11.158, Education Code, 21 is amended to read as follows: 22 The board may not charge fees for: 23 (b) 24 (1)instructional materials [textbooks], workbooks, laboratory supplies, or other supplies necessary for participation 25 in any instructional course except as authorized under this code; 26 27 (2) field trips required as a part of a basic education 3

1 program or course;

2 (3) any specific form of dress necessary for any
3 required educational program or diplomas;

4 (4) the payment of instructional costs for necessary
5 school personnel employed in any course or educational program
6 required for graduation;

7 (5) library <u>materials</u> [books] required to be used for
8 any educational course or program, other than fines for lost,
9 damaged, or overdue <u>materials</u> [books];

10 (6) admission to any activity the student is required11 to attend as a prerequisite to graduation;

12 (7) admission to or examination in any required13 educational course or program; or

15 SECTION 9. Subsection (a), Section 11.164, Education Code, 16 is amended to read as follows:

(a) The board of trustees of each school district shall
limit redundant requests for information and the number and length
of written reports that a classroom teacher is required to prepare.
A classroom teacher may not be required to prepare any written
information other than:

(1) any report concerning the health, safety, orwelfare of a student;

24 (2) a report of a student's grade on an assignment or25 examination;

26 (3) a report of a student's academic progress in a27 class or course;

(4) a report of a student's grades at the end of each
 grade reporting period;

3 (5) a [textbook] report <u>on instructional materials;</u>
4 (6) a unit or weekly lesson plan that outlines, in a
5 brief and general manner, the information to be presented during
6 each period at the secondary level or in each subject or topic at
7 the elementary level;

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(7) an attendance report;

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(,) an accontance report,

(8) any report required for accreditation review;

10 (9) any information required by a school district that 11 relates to a complaint, grievance, or actual or potential 12 litigation and that requires the classroom teacher's involvement; 13 or

14 (10) any information specifically required by law,15 rule, or regulation.

SECTION 10. Subsection (e), Section 19.007, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(e) The district may participate in the <u>instructional</u>
 <u>materials</u> [<del>textbook</del>] program under Chapter 31.

20 SECTION 11. Subsections (a) and (c), Section 26.006, 21 Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

22 (a) A parent is entitled to:

(1) review all teaching materials, <u>instructional</u> <u>materials</u> [textbooks], and other teaching aids used in the classroom of the parent's child; and

26 (2) review each test administered to the parent's27 child after the test is administered.

1 (c) A student's parent is entitled to request that the 2 school district or open-enrollment charter school the student attends allow the student to take home any instructional materials 3 [textbook] used by the student. Subject to the availability of the 4 instructional materials [a textbook], the district or school shall 5 honor the request. A student who takes home instructional 6 7 <u>materials</u> [a textbook] must return the <u>instructional materials</u> [textbook] to school at the beginning of the next school day if 8 9 requested to do so by the student's teacher. In this subsection, "instructional material" ["textbook"] has the meaning assigned by 10 Section 31.002. 11 SECTION 12. Subsections (a), (c), (h), and (n), Section 12 13 28.002, Education Code, are amended to read as follows: Each school district that offers kindergarten through 14 (a) 15 grade 12 shall offer, as a required curriculum: 16 (1)a foundation curriculum that includes: 17 English language arts; (A) 18 (B) mathematics; (C) science; and 19 20 (D) social studies, consisting of Texas, United States, and world history, government, economics, with emphasis on 21 the free enterprise system and its benefits, and geography; and 22 (2) an enrichment curriculum that includes: 23 (A) to the extent possible, languages other than 24 25 English;

(B) health, with emphasis on the importance ofproper nutrition and exercise;

(C) physical education;

(D) fine arts;

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3 (E) [economics, with emphasis on the free
4 enterprise system and its benefits;

5 [<del>(F)</del>] career and technology education;

(F) [(G)] technology applications; and

7 <u>(G)</u> [<del>(H)</del>] religious literature, including the 8 Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament) and New Testament, and its impact 9 on history and literature.

10 (C) The State Board of Education, with the direct 11 participation of educators, parents, business and industry representatives, and employers shall by rule identify the essential 12 knowledge and skills of each subject of the required curriculum 13 that all students should be able to demonstrate and that will be 14 15 used in evaluating instructional materials [textbooks] under Chapter 31 and addressed on the assessment instruments required 16 under Subchapter B, Chapter 39. As a condition of accreditation, 17 the board shall require each district to provide instruction in the 18 essential knowledge and skills at appropriate grade levels. 19

The State Board of Education and each school district 20 (h) shall foster the continuation of the tradition of teaching United 21 States and Texas history and the free enterprise system in regular 22 subject matter and in reading courses and in the adoption of 23 24 instructional materials [textbooks]. A primary purpose of the 25 public school curriculum is to prepare thoughtful, active citizens who understand the importance of patriotism and can function 26 27 productively in a free enterprise society with appreciation for the

1 basic democratic values of our state and national heritage.

2 (n) The State Board of Education may by rule develop and 3 implement a plan designed to incorporate foundation curriculum 4 requirements into the career and technology education curriculum 5 under Subsection (a)(2)(E) [(a)(2)(F)].

6 SECTION 13. Subsections (a) and (d), Section 28.0022, 7 Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

8 (a) Not later than November 1, 2007, the agency shall 9 establish a panel under this section to:

10 (1) review and recommend revisions to the career and 11 technical education curriculum under Section <u>28.002(a)(2)(E)</u> 12 [<del>28.002(a)(2)(F)</del>]; and

13 (2) review and recommend revisions for the program in 14 which high schools and articulated postsecondary institutions 15 allow high school students to take advanced technical credit 16 courses.

17 (d) Not later than November 1, 2008, the panel shall:

18 (1) complete the review as required by this section 19 of:

20 (A) the career and technical education21 curriculum; and

(B) the program under which high schools and
 articulated postsecondary institutions allow high school students
 to take advanced technical credit courses; and

(2) make recommendations to the State Board of26 Education as necessary to:

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(A) increase the academic rigor of the career and

1 technical education curriculum under Section <u>28.002(a)(2)(E)</u> 2 [<del>28.002(a)(2)(F)</del>]; and

(B) improve and increase participation in the
program under which high schools and articulated postsecondary
institutions allow high school students to take advanced technical
credit courses.

7 SECTION 14. Subsection (b), Section 28.003, Education Code, 8 is amended to read as follows:

9 (b) In this section, "educational program" means a course or 10 series of courses in the required curriculum under Section 28.002, 11 other than a fine arts course under Section 28.002(a)(2)(D) or a 12 career and technology course under Section <u>28.002(a)(2)(E)</u> 13 [<u>28.002(a)(2)(F)</u>].

SECTION 15. Subsection (c), Section 28.011, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

(c) A student may not be required to use a specific translation as the sole text of the Hebrew Scriptures or New Testament and may use as the basic <u>instructional material</u> [textbook] a different translation of the Hebrew Scriptures or New Testament from that chosen by the board of trustees of the student's school district or the student's teacher.

22 SECTION 16. The heading to Chapter 31, Education Code, is 23 amended to read as follows:

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#### CHAPTER 31. INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS [TEXTBOOKS]

25 SECTION 17. Section 31.001, Education Code, is amended to 26 read as follows:

27 Sec. 31.001. FREE <u>INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS</u> [TEXTBOOKS].

Instructional materials [Textbooks] selected for use in the public schools shall be furnished without cost to the students attending those schools. Except as provided by Section 31.104(d), a school district may not charge a student for instructional material or technological equipment purchased by the district with the district's instructional materials allotment.

SECTION 18. Subdivisions (1), (1-a), (2), and (4), Section
31.002, Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

9 (1) <u>"Instructional material"</u> [<u>"Electronic textbook"</u>] means content that conveys the essential knowledge and skills of a 10 subject in the public school curriculum through a medium or a 11 combination of media for conveying information to a student. The 12 13 term includes a book, supplementary materials, a combination of a book, workbook, and supplementary materials, computer software, 14 [interactive videodisc,] magnetic media, DVD, CD-ROM, computer 15 16 courseware, on-line services, or an electronic medium, or other means of conveying information to the student or otherwise 17 contributing to the learning process through electronic means, 18 including [an] open-source instructional material [textbook]. 19

instructional material" 20 (1-a) "Open-source [<del>an</del>] electronic instructional material 21 [textbook"] means [textbook] that is available for downloading from the Internet at 22 no charge to a student and without requiring the purchase of an 23 unlock code, membership, or other access or use charge, except for a 24 charge to order an optional printed copy of all or part of the 25 instructional material [textbook]. The term includes 26 [<del>a</del>] 27 state-developed open-source instructional material [textbook]

1 purchased under Subchapter B-1.

2 (2) "Publisher" includes an on-line service or a
3 developer or distributor of [an] electronic instructional
4 materials [textbook].

5 (4) "Technological equipment" means hardware, a 6 device, or equipment necessary for:

7 (A) instructional use in the classroom,
8 including to gain access to or enhance the use of [an] electronic
9 <u>instructional materials</u> [textbook]; or

(B) professional use by a classroom teacher.
 SECTION 19. Subchapter A, Chapter 31, Education Code, is
 amended by amending Sections 31.003 and 31.004 and adding Section

13 31.005 to read as follows:

Sec. 31.003. RULES. The State Board of Education may adopt rules, consistent with this chapter, for the adoption, requisition, distribution, care, use, and disposal of <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks].

18 Sec. 31.004. CERTIFICATION OF PROVISION OF [TEXTBOOKS, ELECTRONIC TEXTBOOKS, AND] INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS. Each school 19 20 district and open-enrollment charter school shall annually certify to the State Board of Education and the commissioner that, for each 21 subject in the required curriculum under Section 28.002 and each 22 grade level, the district provides each student with [textbooks, 23 24 electronic textbooks, or] instructional materials that cover all 25 elements of the essential knowledge and skills adopted by the State Board of Education for that subject and grade level. 26

27 Sec. 31.005. FUNDING FOR OPEN-ENROLLMENT CHARTER SCHOOLS.

An open-enrollment charter school is entitled to the instructional 1 2 materials allotment under this chapter and is subject to this 3 chapter as if the school were a school district. 4 SECTION 20. The heading to Section 31.021, Education Code, is amended to read as follows: 5 Sec. 31.021. STATE INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS 6 [TEXTBOOK] 7 FUND. SECTION 21. Section 31.021, Education Code, is amended by 8 amending Subsections (a) and (d) and adding Subsection (c) to read 9 as follows: 10 11 (a) The state <u>instructional materials</u> [textbook] fund consists of: 12 13 (1) an amount set aside by the State Board of Education from the available school fund, in accordance with Section 14 43.001(d); and 15 16 (2) [all funds accruing from the state's sale of disused textbooks; and 17 [(3)] all amounts lawfully paid into the fund from any 18 other source. 19 20 (c) Money in the state instructional materials fund shall be used to: 21 22 (1) fund the instructional materials allotment, as provided by Section 31.0211; 23 24 (2) purchase special instructional materials for the education of blind and visually impaired students in public 25 26 schools; 27 (3) pay the expenses associated with the instructional

1 materials adoption and review process under this chapter; 2 (4) pay the expenses associated with the purchase or 3 licensing of open-source instructional material, to the extent 4 authorized by the General Appropriations Act; and 5 (5) pay the expenses associated with the purchase of instructional material, including freight, shipping, and insurance 6 7 expenses. Money transferred to the state instructional materials 8 (d) 9 [textbook] fund remains in the fund until spent and does not lapse to the state at the end of the fiscal year. 10 11 SECTION 22. Subchapter B, Chapter 31, Education Code, is 12 amended by adding Sections 31.0211, 31.0212, 31.0213, and 31.0214 13 to read as follows: Sec. 31.0211. INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS ALLOTMENT. (a) A 14 school district is entitled to an annual allotment from the state 15 16 instructional materials fund for each student enrolled in the district on a date during the preceding school year specified by the 17 commissioner. The commissioner shall determine the amount of the 18 allotment per student each year on the basis of the amount of money 19 20 available in the state instructional materials fund to fund the allotment. An allotment under this section shall be transferred 21 from the state instructional materials fund to the credit of the 22 district's instructional materials account as provided by Section 23 31.0212. 24 25 (b) A juvenile justice alternative education program under 26 Section 37.011 is entitled to an allotment from the state

27 instructional materials fund in an amount determined by the

1	commissioner. The program shall use the allotment to purchase
2	items listed in Subsection (c) for students enrolled in the
3	program. The commissioner's determination under this subsection is
4	final and may not be appealed.
5	(c) Subject to Subsection (d), funds allotted under this
6	section may be used to:
7	(1) purchase:
8	(A) materials on the list adopted by the
9	commissioner, as provided by Section 31.0231;
10	(B) instructional materials, regardless of
11	whether the instructional materials are on the conforming or
12	nonconforming list, as provided by Section 31.024;
13	(C) consumable instructional materials,
14	including workbooks;
15	(D) instructional materials for use in bilingual
16	education classes, as provided by Section 31.029;
17	(E) supplemental instructional materials, as
18	provided by Section 31.035;
19	(F) state-developed open-source instructional
20	materials, as provided by Subchapter B-1;
21	(G) instructional materials and technological
22	equipment under any continuing contracts of the district in effect
23	on September 1, 2011; and
24	(H) technological equipment necessary to support
25	the use of materials included on the list adopted by the
26	commissioner under Section 31.0231 or any instructional materials
27	purchased with an allotment under this section; and

1	(2) pay for training educational personnel directly
2	involved in student learning in the appropriate use of
3	instructional materials and for providing for access to
4	technological equipment for instructional use.
5	(d) Each year a school district shall use the district's
6	allotment under this section to purchase, in the following order:
7	(1) instructional materials necessary to permit the
8	district to certify that the district has instructional materials
9	that cover all elements of the essential knowledge and skills of the
10	required curriculum for each grade level as required by Section
11	28.002; and
12	(2) any other instructional materials or
13	technological equipment as determined by the district.
14	(d-1) Notwithstanding Subsection (d), for the state fiscal
15	biennium beginning September 1, 2011, a school district shall use
16	an allotment received under this section to purchase instructional
17	materials that will assist the district in satisfying performance
18	standards under Section 39.0241, as added by Chapter 895 (H.B. 3),
19	Acts of the 81st Legislature, Regular Session, 2009, on assessment
20	instruments adopted under Sections 39.023(a) and (c).
21	(d-2) Subsection $(d-1)$ and this subsection expire August
22	<u>31, 2013.</u>
23	(e) Not later than May 31 of each school year, a school
24	district may request that the commissioner adjust the number of
25	students for which the district is entitled to receive an allotment
26	under Subsection (a) on the grounds that the number of students
27	attending school in the district will increase or decrease during

1	the school year for which the allotment is provided. The
2	commissioner may also adjust the number of students for which a
3	district is entitled to receive an allotment, without a request by
4	the district, if the commissioner determines that a different
5	number of students is a more accurate reflection of students who
6	will be attending school in the district. The commissioner's
7	determination under this subsection is final.
8	(f) The commissioner may adopt rules as necessary to
9	implement this section.
10	Sec. 31.0212. INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS ACCOUNT. (a) The
11	commissioner shall maintain an instructional materials account for
12	each school district. Each school year, the commissioner shall
13	deposit in the account for each district the amount of the
14	district's instructional materials allotment under Section
15	<u>31.0211.</u>
16	(b) The commissioner shall pay the cost of instructional
17	materials requisitioned by a school district under Section 31.103
18	using funds from the district's instructional materials account.
19	(c) A school district may also use funds in the district's
20	account to purchase electronic instructional materials or
21	technological equipment. The district shall submit to the
22	commissioner a request for funds for this purpose from the
23	district's account. The commissioner shall adopt rules regarding
24	the documentation a school district must submit to receive funds
25	under this subsection.
26	(d) Money deposited in a school district's instructional
27	materials account during each state fiscal biennium remains in the

account and available for use by the district for the entire 1 2 biennium. At the end of each biennium, a district with unused money 3 in the district's account may carry forward any remaining balance 4 to the next biennium. 5 (e) The commissioner may adopt rules as necessary to 6 implement this section. 7 Sec. 31.0213. CERTIFICATION OF USE OF INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS ALLOTMENT. Each school district shall annually certify 8 to the commissioner that the district's instructional materials 9 allotment has been used only for expenses allowed by Section 10 11 31.0211. Sec. 31.0214. ADJUSTMENT FOR HIGH ENROLLMENT GROWTH 12 13 DISTRICTS. (a) Each year the commissioner shall adjust the instructional materials allotment of school districts experiencing 14 high enrollment growth. The commissioner shall establish a 15 procedure for determining high enrollment growth districts 16 eligible to receive an adjustment under this section and the amount 17 of the instructional materials allotment those districts will 18 19 receive. 20 (b) The commissioner may adopt rules as necessary to 21 implement this section. 22 SECTION 23. The heading to Section 31.022, Education Code, is amended to read as follows: 23 Sec. 31.022. INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS [TEXTBOOK] REVIEW AND 24 25 ADOPTION. SECTION 24. Subsections (a), (b), (c), (e), and (f), 26 27 Section 31.022, Education Code, are amended to read as follows:

(a) The State Board of Education shall adopt a review and
adoption cycle for <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] for
elementary grade levels, including prekindergarten, and secondary
grade levels, for each subject in the required curriculum under
Section 28.002. <u>In adopting the cycle, the board:</u>

6 (1) is not required to review and adopt instructional 7 materials for all grade levels in a single year; and

8 (2) shall give priority to instructional materials in
9 the following subjects:

10 <u>(A) foundation curriculum subjects for which the</u> 11 essential knowledge and skills have been substantially revised and 12 for which assessment instruments are required under Subchapter B, 13 <u>Chapter 39</u>, including career and technology courses that satisfy 14 foundation curriculum requirements as provided by Section 15 <u>28.002(n);</u>

16 (B) foundation curriculum subjects for which the 17 essential knowledge and skills have been substantially revised, 18 including career and technology courses that satisfy foundation 19 curriculum requirements as provided by Section 28.002(n);

20 (C) foundation curriculum subjects not described
21 by Paragraph (A) or (B), including career and technology courses
22 that satisfy foundation curriculum requirements as provided by
23 Section 28.002(n); and

(D) enrichment curriculum subjects.
 (b) The board shall organize the cycle for subjects in the
 foundation curriculum so that not more than <u>one-fourth</u> [<del>one-sixth</del>]
 of the <u>instructional materials</u> [<del>textbooks</del>] for subjects in the

foundation curriculum are reviewed each biennium [year]. The board 1 2 shall adopt rules to provide for a full and complete investigation of instructional materials [textbooks] for each subject in the 3 foundation curriculum [at least] every <a href="mailto:eight">eight</a> [six] years. 4 The adoption of instructional materials [textbooks] for a subject in 5 the foundation curriculum may be extended beyond the eight-year 6 7 [six-year] period only if the content of instructional materials [textbooks] for a subject is sufficiently current. 8

9 (c) The board shall adopt rules to provide for a full and 10 complete investigation of <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] for 11 each subject in the enrichment curriculum on a cycle the board 12 considers appropriate.

(e) The board shall designate a request for production of <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] in a subject area and grade level by the school year in which the <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] are intended to be made available in classrooms and not by the school year in which the board makes the request for production.

(f) The board shall amend any request for production issued for the purchase of <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] to conform to the <u>instructional materials</u> [textbook] funding levels provided by the General Appropriations Act for the year of implementation.

23 SECTION 25. Section 31.0221, Education Code, is amended to 24 read as follows:

25 Sec. 31.0221. MIDCYCLE REVIEW AND ADOPTION OF <u>INSTRUCTIONAL</u> 26 <u>MATERIALS</u> [TEXTBOOKS]. (a) The State Board of Education shall 27 adopt rules for the midcycle review and adoption of <u>instructional</u>

1 <u>material</u> [a textbook] for a subject for which <u>instructional</u> 2 <u>materials</u> [textbooks] are not currently under review by the board 3 under Section 31.022. The rules must require:

4 (1) the publisher of the <u>instructional material</u>
5 [textbook] to pay a fee to the board to cover the cost of the
6 midcycle review and adoption of the <u>instructional material</u>
7 [textbook];

8 (2) the publisher of the <u>instructional material</u> 9 [textbook] to enter into a contract with the board concerning the 10 <u>instructional material</u> [textbook] for a term that ends at the same 11 time as any contract entered into by the board for <u>other</u> 12 <u>instructional materials</u> [another textbook] for the same subject and 13 grade level; and

14 (3) a commitment from the publisher to provide the 15 <u>instructional material</u> [textbook] to school districts in the manner 16 specified by the publisher, which may include:

17 (A) providing the <u>instructional material</u> 18 [textbook] to any district in a regional education service center 19 area identified by the publisher; or

A student who fails to return in an acceptable condition 6 all <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks, including electronic 7 textbooks, and technological equipment forfeits the right to free 8 9 instructional materials [textbooks, including electronic textbooks, and technological equipment until all instructional 10 11 <u>materials</u> [each textbook, including an electronic textbook,] and [all] technological equipment previously issued but not returned in 12 13 an acceptable condition are [is] paid for by the student, parent, or As provided by policy of the board of trustees or 14 guardian. governing body, a school district or open-enrollment charter school 15 16 may waive or reduce the payment requirement if the student is from a low-income family. The district or school shall allow the student 17 to use instructional materials [textbooks, including electronic 18 textbooks, and technological equipment at school during each 19 20 school day.
