- 1-17 relating to canine encounter training for peace officers. 1-18 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 1-19 SECTION 1. Section 1701.253, Occupations Code, is amended
- 1-20 by adding Subsection (1) to read as follows: 1-21 (1) As part of the minimum curriculum requirements, the 1-22 commission shall require an officer licensed by the commission on 1-23 or after January 1, 2016, to complete a canine encounter training 1-24 program established by the commission under Section 1701.261. An 1-25 officer shall complete the program not later than the second 1-26 anniversary of the date the officer is licensed under this chapter 1-27 unless the officer completes the program as part of the officer's 1-28 basic training course.
