STATE LIABILITY; PERSONS COVERED. In a cause 7 of action based on conduct described in Section 104.002, the state 8 9 shall indemnify the following persons, without regard to whether 10 the persons performed their services for compensation, for actual 11 damages, court costs, and attorney's fees adjudged against: 12 (1) an employee, a member of the governing board, or any other officer of a state agency, institution, or department; 13 14 (2) a former employee, former member of the governing board, or any other former officer of a state agency, institution, 15 16 or department who was an employee or officer when the act or omission on which the damages are based occurred; 17 18 a physician or psychiatrist licensed in this state (3) who was performing services under a contract with any state agency, 19 20 institution, or department or a racing official performing services 21 under a contract with the Texas Racing Commission when the act or omission on which the damages are based occurred; 22 23 (3-a) a phlebotomist licensed in this state who was 24

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performing services under a contract with the Texas Department of

Criminal Justice when the act or omission on which the damages are

3 (4) a chaplain or spiritual advisor who was performing 4 services under contract with the Texas Department of Criminal 5 Justice [, the Texas Youth Commission,] or the Texas Juvenile 6 Justice Department [Probation Commission] when the act or omission 7 on which the damages are based occurred;

8 (5) a person serving on the governing board of a 9 foundation, corporation, or association at the request and on 10 behalf of an institution of higher education, as that term is 11 defined by Section 61.003(8), Education Code, not including a 12 public junior college;

13 (6) a state contractor who signed a waste manifest as14 required by a state contract; or

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(7) the estate of a person listed in this section.

SECTION 2. Article 13.34, Code of Criminal Procedure, is amended to read as follows:

Art. 13.34. CERTAIN OFFENSES COMMITTED AGAINST A CHILD 18 19 COMMITTED TO THE TEXAS JUVENILE JUSTICE DEPARTMENT [YOUTH COMMISSION]. An offense described by Article 104.003(a) committed 20 by an employee or officer of the Texas <u>Juvenile Justice Department</u> 21 [Youth Commission] or a person providing services under a contract 22 23 with the department [commission] against a child committed to the 24 <u>department</u> [commission] may be prosecuted in:

(1) any county in which an element of the offense26 occurred; or

27 (2) Travis County.

(A) until the inmate is executed, dies, or is
released on parole, if the defendant is convicted of a capital
felony;

(B) until the defendant dies, completes the
defendant's sentence, or is released on parole or mandatory
supervision, if the defendant is sentenced to a term of confinement
or imprisonment in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice;

(C) until the defendant completes the defendant's term of community supervision, including deferred adjudication community supervision, if the defendant is placed on community supervision;

supervision, or juvenile probation, if the defendant is committed 1 to the Texas <u>Juvenile Justice Department</u> [Youth Commission]; or 2 3 (E) until the defendant completes the defendant's term of juvenile probation, including a term of 4 5 community supervision upon transfer of supervision to a criminal court, if the defendant is placed on juvenile probation. 6 SECTION 5. Article 49.18(d)(3), Code of Criminal Procedure, 7 8 is amended to read as follows: 9 "State juvenile facility" means any facility or (3) 10 halfway house: operated by or under contract with the Texas 11 (A) 12 Juvenile Justice Department [Youth Commission]; or (B) described by Section 51.02(13) or 13 (14),14 Family Code. 15 SECTION 6. Articles 60.03(a) and (b), Code of Criminal Procedure, are amended to read as follows: 16 17 (a) Criminal justice agencies, the Legislative Budget Board, and the council are entitled to access to the data bases of 18 19 the Department of Public Safety, the Texas Juvenile Justice Department [Probation Commission, the Texas Youth Commission], and 20 the Texas Department of Criminal Justice in accordance with 21 applicable state or federal law or regulations. 8 (c) In determining whether information is required to be 9 removed from an intelligence database under Subsection (b), the 10 five-year period does not include any period during which the 11 individual who is the subject of the information is:

12 (1) confined in a correctional facility operated by or13 under contract with the Texas Department of Criminal Justice;

14 (2) committed to a secure correctional facility 15 operated by or under contract with the Texas <u>Juvenile Justice</u> 16 <u>Department</u> [Youth Commission], as defined by Section 51.02, Family 17 Code; or

2 SECTION 25. Section 30.101, Education Code, is amended to 3 read as follows:

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4 Sec. 30.101. PURPOSE. The purpose of this subchapter is to provide the state available school fund apportionment to children 5 committed to the Texas Juvenile Justice Department [Youth 6 Commission]. То provide the state available school 7 fund 8 apportionment for educational purposes, the educational programs provided to those children are considered to be educational 9 10 services provided by public schools.

SECTION 26. Section 30.102, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 30.102. ALLOCATION. (a) The Texas <u>Juvenile Justice</u> <u>Department</u> [Youth Commission] is entitled to receive the state available school fund apportionment based on the average daily attendance in the <u>department's</u> [commission's] educational programs of students who are at least three years of age and not older than 21 years of age.

(b) A classroom teacher, full-time librarian, full-time 19 school counselor certified under Subchapter B, Chapter 21, or 20 full-time school nurse employed by the <u>department</u> [commission] is 21 entitled to receive as a minimum salary the monthly salary 22 specified by Section 21.402. A classroom teacher, full-time 23 24 librarian, full-time school counselor, or full-time school nurse may be paid, from funds appropriated to the 25 department 26 [commission], a salary in excess of the minimum specified by that section, but the salary may not exceed the rate of pay for a similar 27

1 position in the public schools of an adjacent school district.

2 (c) The commissioner, with the of the assistance 3 comptroller, shall determine the amount that the department [commission] would have received from the available school fund if 4 5 Chapter 28, Acts of the 68th Legislature, 2nd Called Session, 1984, had not transferred statutorily dedicated taxes from the available 6 school fund to the foundation school fund. That amount, minus any 7 8 amount the schools do receive from the available school fund, shall be set apart as a separate account in the foundation school fund and 9 10 appropriated to the <u>department</u> [commission] for educational purposes. 11

12 SECTION 27. Section 30.103, Education Code, is amended to 13 read as follows:

Sec. 30.103. MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING. 14 The Texas Juvenile Justice Department [Youth Commission] with the assistance 15 of the Texas Workforce Commission and the Texas Workforce 16 17 Investment Council shall by rule adopt а memorandum of understanding that establishes the respective responsibility of 18 19 those entities to provide through local workforce development boards job training and employment assistance programs to children 20 committed or formerly sentenced to the department [Texas Youth 21 Commission]. The department [Texas Youth Commission] shall 22 coordinate the development of the memorandum of understanding and 23 24 include in its annual report information describing the number of children in the preceding year receiving services under the 25 26 memorandum.

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SECTION 28. Section 30.104, Education Code, is amended to

1 read as follows:

2 Sec. 30.104. CREDIT FOR COMPLETION OF EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS; 3 HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA AND CERTIFICATE. (a) A school district shall 4 grant to a student credit toward the academic course requirements 5 for high school graduation for courses the student successfully 6 completes in Texas <u>Juvenile Justice Department</u> [Youth Commission] 7 educational programs.

8 (b) A student may graduate and receive a diploma from a
9 <u>department</u> [Texas Youth Commission] educational program if:

10 (1) the student successfully completes the curriculum 11 requirements identified by the State Board of Education under 12 Section 28.025(a) and complies with Section 39.025; or

(2) the student successfully completes the curriculum
requirements under Section 28.025(a) as modified by an
individualized education program developed under Section 29.005.

16 (c) A <u>department</u> [Texas Youth Commission] educational 17 program may issue a certificate of course-work completion to a 18 student who successfully completes the curriculum requirements 19 identified by the State Board of Education under Section 28.025(a) 20 but who fails to comply with Section 39.025.

21 SECTION 29. Section 30.106, Education Code, is amended to 22 read as follows:

23 Sec. 30.106. READING AND BEHAVIOR PLAN. (a) Because 24 learning and behavior are inextricably linked and learning and 25 improved behavior correlate with decreased recidivism rates, the 26 Texas <u>Juvenile Justice Department</u> [Youth Commission] shall not only 27 fulfill the <u>department's</u> [commission's] duties under state and

1 federal law to provide general and special educational services to students in department [commission] educational programs but also 2 3 shall implement a comprehensive plan to improve the reading skills and behavior of those students. 4 5 (b) To improve the reading skills of students in department [Texas Youth Commission] educational programs, the department 6 [commission] shall: 7 8 (1)adopt a reliable battery of reading assessments that: 9 10 (A) are based on a normative sample appropriate to students in <u>department</u> [commission] educational programs; 11 12 (B) are designed to be administered on an individual basis; and 13 14 (C) allow school employees to: 15 (i) evaluate performance in each essential component of effective reading instruction, including phonemic 16 awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension; 17 (ii) monitor 18 progress in areas of 19 deficiency specific to an individual student; and 20 (iii) provide reading performance data; administer the 21 (2)assessments adopted under Subdivision (1): 22 23 (A) at periodic intervals not to exceed 12 months, to each student in a <u>department</u> [commission] educational 24 25 program; and 26 (B) at least 15 days and not more than 30 days before a student is released from the department [commission]; 27

(3) provide at least 60 minutes per school day of
