A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

2 relating to the preservation of the Alamo complex and surrounding
3 area and to the Alamo Preservation Advisory Board.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

5 SECTION 1. Subchapter I, Chapter 31, Natural Resources
6 Code, is amended by adding Section 31.450 to read as follows:

7 Sec. 31.450. FINDINGS; MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING. (a)
8 The legislature finds that:

9 (1) the Alamo has played an important role in the
10 history of this state and continues to be a symbol of liberty and
11 freedom for this state;

12 (2) this state wants to honor the individuals whose
13 lives were lost at the Alamo;

14 (3) the entire history of the Alamo, from the time the
15 Alamo was established as a mission until the present, should be
16 recognized; and

17 (4) the Alamo is a world-class destination that
18 provides a place of remembrance and education.

19 (b) The land office shall enter into a memorandum of
20 understanding with the City of San Antonio to coordinate the
21 planning and development of improvements to the Alamo complex and
22 the area immediately surrounding the complex.

23 SECTION 2. Sections 31.455(a) and (b), Natural Resources
24 Code, are amended to read as follows:

1 (a) The land office may establish an Alamo Preservation
2 Advisory Board to provide advice, proposals, and recommendations
3 to:

4 (1) promote the development of a world-class site to
5 educate visitors on the history and importance of the Alamo in this
6 state's fight for independence and to honor the people who lost
7 their lives at the Alamo;

8 (2) promote and support the Alamo complex;

9 (3) [~~2~~] provide the resources and support necessary
10 to advance the understanding and education of current and future
11 generations on the historical significance and factual record of
12 the Alamo complex;

25 state that preserve the historical character of the Alamo shrine;

1 governmental and private organizations that are committed to
2 objectives similar to the objectives described in this subsection.

3 (b) The advisory board is composed of:

4 (1) the commissioner or the commissioner's designee,
5 who serves as the presiding officer of the advisory board;

6 (2) a designee appointed by the governor;

7 (3) a designee appointed by the commissioner [~~the~~
8 ~~president general of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas~~];

9 (4) a representative of the Alamo Endowment, appointed
10 by the commissioner [~~the current Alamo chairperson of the Daughters~~
11 ~~of the Republic of Texas~~];

12 (5) the director of the Alamo [~~immediate past Alamo~~
13 ~~chairperson of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas~~];

14 (6) the Alamo curator;

15 (7) one representative of the Texas Historical
16 Commission;

17 (8) a designee appointed by the county judge of [~~the~~
18 ~~president of the~~] Bexar County [~~Historical Commission~~]; and

19 (9) a designee appointed by the mayor [~~one~~
20 ~~representative who serves as a member~~] of the City of San Antonio
21 [~~Office of Historic Preservation~~].

22 SECTION 3. (a) The term of a member serving on the Alamo
23 Preservation Advisory Board immediately before the effective date
24 of this Act whose position on the board is abolished by the changes
25 in law made by this Act expires on the effective date of this Act.

26 (b) As soon as practicable after the effective date of this
27 Act, each appointing official shall appoint members to the Alamo

1 Preservation Advisory Board as required by Section 31.455, Natural
2 Resources Code, as amended by this Act.

3 (c) As soon as practicable after the effective date of this
4 Act, the General Land Office shall enter into a memorandum of
5 understanding with the City of San Antonio as required by Section
6 31.450(b), Natural Resources Code, as added by this Act.

7 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect September 1, 2015.

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

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relating to the preservation of the Alamo complex.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Subchapter I, Chapter 31, Natural Resources Code, is amended by adding Section 31.450 to read as follows:

Sec. 31.450. FINDINGS. (a) The legislature finds that:

(1) the Alamo has played an important role in the history of this state and continues to be a symbol of liberty and freedom for this state;

(2) this state wants to honor the individuals whose lives were lost at the Alamo;

(3) the entire history of the Alamo, from the time the Alamo was established as a mission until the present, should be recognized; and

(4) the Alamo is a world-class destination that provides a place of remembrance and education.

(b) The land office is encouraged to consult and coordinate with the City of San Antonio on the planning and development of improvements to the Alamo.

SECTION 2. Section 31.455(a), Natural Resources Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) The land office may establish an Alamo Preservation Advisory Board to provide advice, proposals, and recommendations to:

IN RE: HB2968 by Guillen (Relating to the Alamo preservation fund and the establishment of an Alamo preservation fund advisory committee.), **As Introduced**

The fiscal implications of the bill are contingent upon the enactment and subsequent voter approval of a joint resolution that would make a one-time transfer of money from the Economic Stabilization Fund to the new Alamo Preservation Fund.

The bill would amend the Natural Resources Code to create the Alamo Preservation Fund (APF) and to establish the Alamo Preservation Fund Advisory Committee.

The APF would be a special fund in the state Treasury outside the General Revenue Fund as established by Section 49-q, Article III, of the Texas Constitution. The General Land Office (GLO) (1) would manage the fund and could accept gifts, grants or donations; (2) could spend money from the fund for the bill's purposes and in amounts that are less than or equal to the amounts received by the GLO for the same purposes from federal, local and private sources; (3) would retain not less than \$25 million in an account in the fund to be known as the Alamo Operation and Maintenance Trust Account.

The bill would create an Advisory Committee to advise GLO on expenditures of money from the APF. The Advisory Committee would consist of 15 members appointed by state officials and officials from Bexar County and the city of San Antonio. The General Land Office indicates it could absorb the costs associated with implementing the provisions of the bill within its current resources.

This legislation would do one or more of the following: create or recreate a dedicated account in the General Revenue Fund, create or recreate a special or trust fund either with or outside of the Treasury, or create a dedicated revenue source. The fund, account, or revenue dedication included in this bill would be subject to funds consolidation review by the current Legislature.

The bill would take effect December 1, 2015, but only if the constitutional amendment to establish the APF and make a one-time transfer of money from the Economic Stabilization Fund to the APF is approved by the voters.
