A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

1-19 relating to the operation of all-terrain vehicles and recreational 1-20 off-highway vehicles. 1-21

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

1-22 1-23 SECTION 1. Sections 663.037(d) and (g), Transportation Code, are amended to read as follows: 1-24

(d) The operator of an all-terrain vehicle may drive the 1-25 vehicle on a public street, road, or highway that is not an interstate or limited-access highway if: 1-26 (1)

the transportation is in connection with:
