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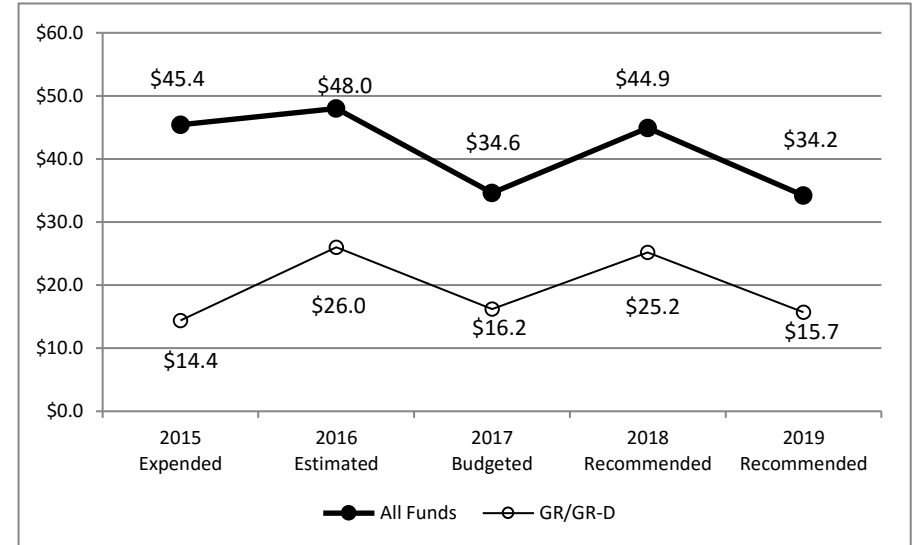

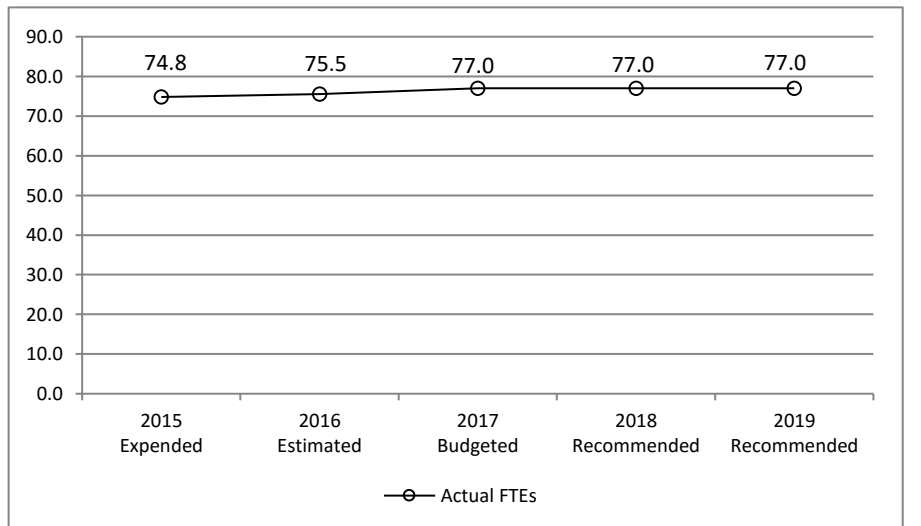

Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - House**

1. **Appellate Court Operations:** Recommendations continue funding and FTE levels for Appellate Court Operations at 2016–17 levels to maintain the court’s disposition rate at 100 percent. The court included \$0.5 million in General Revenue and authority for 4.0 FTEs for the following in its 4 percent reduction:
 - three law clerk positions (3.0 FTEs) for \$338,250;
 - one deputy clerk position (1.0 FTE) for \$94,296;
 - an increase of \$20,000 for the Supreme Court Advisory Committee travel budget; and
 - an increase of \$2,674 for consumable supplies.

2. **Basic Civil Legal Services:** Recommendations include \$63.0 million in All Funds, which is a \$3.3 million decrease, to provide basic civil legal services to low-income populations through grants to legal aid organizations. This also includes basic civil legal services to veterans and their families and victims of sexual assault.

In fiscal year 2017 (December 2016), the Court received one-time civil penalties totaling \$4.8 million deposited to Judicial Fund No. 573. Of this amount, \$2.9 million was awarded to the State of Texas through civil penalties collected from the State of Texas vs. Amgen, Inc. and \$1.0 million through civil penalties collected from the State of Texas vs Penguin, et al. Recommendations for 2018–19 do not continue these one-time civil penalties. This decrease is anticipated to be offset by a corresponding increase in other revenues deposited to Judicial Fund No. 573 for Basic Civil Legal Services in the 2018–19 biennium, such as Pro Hoc Vice and other filing fees and state bar membership dues, for a total decrease of \$3.3 million from 2016–17 levels.

In December 2016, the Court received \$42.5 million in one-time civil penalties deposited to Judicial Fund No. 573 from a settlement between the State of Texas and Volkswagen. Of this amount, \$1.2 million is appropriated to maintain Basic Civil Legal Services at 2016–17 levels which offsets decreases of \$0.8 million in General Revenue and \$0.4 million in General Revenue–Dedicated Sexual Assault Program No. 5010 for grant funding submitted by the Court as part of the 4 percent reduction. The Court is still determining how much of the remaining \$41.3 million will be spent in fiscal year 2017 and will be available in the 2018–19 biennium.

Recommendations include a new rider that makes \$1.2 million appropriated from Judicial Fund No. 573 contingent on balances from the Volkswagen lawsuit being available. In the event that civil penalties from this settlement are not available in an amount sufficient to cover the full \$1.2 million, the rider reduces the appropriation from Judicial Fund No. 573 by the amount that the balance is less than the \$1.2 million and increases the appropriation from General Revenue by a commensurate amount. (See also, Rider Highlights – House #11 and Items not Included in Recommendations - House #3)

3. **Judicial Compensation Commission:** The Judicial Compensation Commission is recommending a 10.2 percent increase in judicial salaries for the 2018–19 biennium. This would increase the state salary of a Supreme Court Justice from \$168,000 to \$185,136 and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court from \$170,500 to \$187,636. The most recent judicial salary adjustment was a 12 percent increase in the 2014–15 biennium for judge and prosecutor positions linked to district judge pay totaling \$34.8 million across the 2014–15 biennium.
4. **Court Improvement Projects:** The Court anticipates that \$2.0 million in Federal Funds will not be available during the 2018–19 biennium that funds the Supreme Court of Texas Children’s Commission due to anticipated passage of Congressional legislation that would reduce Court Improvement Project federal funding by approximately two-thirds of the currently appropriated amount (\$3.2 million for the 2016–17 biennium). Recommendations do not include this reduction because the Court became aware of this issue in December 2016. This commission was established in 2007 to improve the child welfare system through increasing public awareness of challenges facing children and families involved in the child welfare system and bringing attention to this issue through judicial leadership, reforming judicial practice, and informing policy affecting child welfare (See also, Items Not Included in Recommendations - House #1).

- (1) Judicial Fund No. 573: Fiscal Year 2017 amounts do not include \$42.5 million in civil penalties awarded to the Court through a settlement between the State of Texas and Volkswagen because the Court has yet to make a decision on how much of the settlement amount will be used in fiscal year 2017 and during the 2018-19 biennium. Fiscal year 2018 amounts include \$1.2 million of the settlement amount to offset amounts included by the Court in the 4 percent reduction for basic civil legal services to veterans and their families and victims of sexual assault.
- (2) Legal Services Corporation and Other Federal Funding: Amounts include significant grants to non-BCLS funded legal aid organizations that provide civil legal services to unaccompanied minors.
- (3) Interest on Lawyers Trust Accounts: Amounts for 2017, 2018, and 2019 assume an increase in interest rates by the Federal Reserve.
- (4) Other (Donations and Grants from Foundations): Amount for 2016 includes a one-time \$32.4 million donation, which is restricted to foreclosure and community redevelopment cases. Addition of New Riders

11. **Basic Civil Legal Services: Contingency Appropriation:** Recommendations add a new rider that makes the appropriation of \$1,222,463 in Judicial Fund No. 573 funding in fiscal year 2018 contingent upon the balance of civil penalties remaining from a settlement with Volkswagen deposited to Judicial Fund No. 573 in fiscal year 2017 being sufficient to cover the appropriation. In the event that civil penalties from this settlement are not available in an amount sufficient to cover the full \$1,222,463 appropriation from Judicial Fund No. 573, the rider reduces the appropriation from Judicial Fund No. 573 by the amount that the balance is less than \$1,222,463 and increases the appropriation from General Revenue by a commensurate amount. Modification of Existing Riders

8. **Appropriation: Supreme Court Support Fee, Unexpended Balance Authority Between Biennia:** Recommendations remove unexpended balance authority between biennia and retitle the rider. Recommendations continue estimated appropriation authority for these funds and unexpended balance authority within the biennium for Appellate Court Operations. Deleted Riders

9. **Interagency Contract with Texas Veterans Commission:** Recommendations delete this rider. Actions of the Eighty-fourth Legislature through Article IX, Section 18.05 (d) Texas Veterans Commission and Texas Supreme Court (2016–17 GAA) resulted in the rider having no effect by moving appropriations of \$750,000 in General Revenue each fiscal year from the Texas Supreme Court to the Texas Veterans Commission for Veterans Treatment Court Programs.

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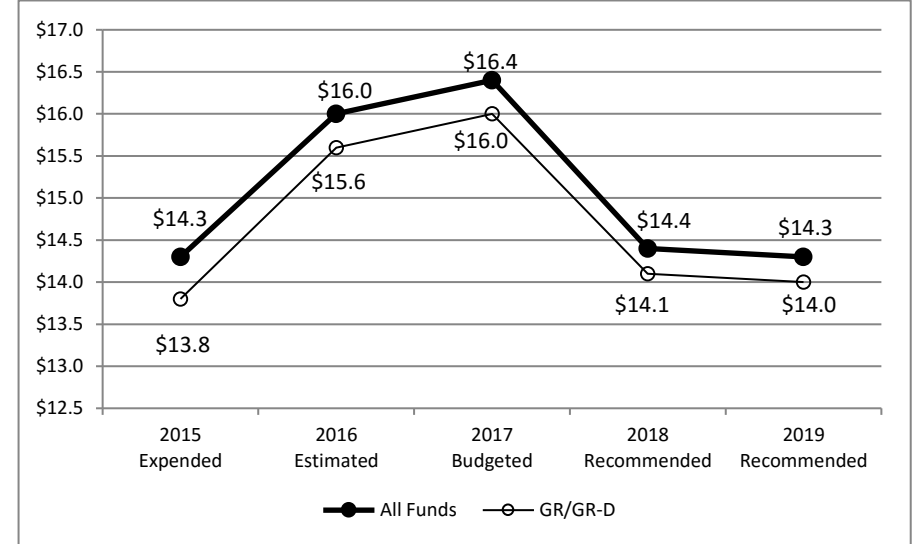

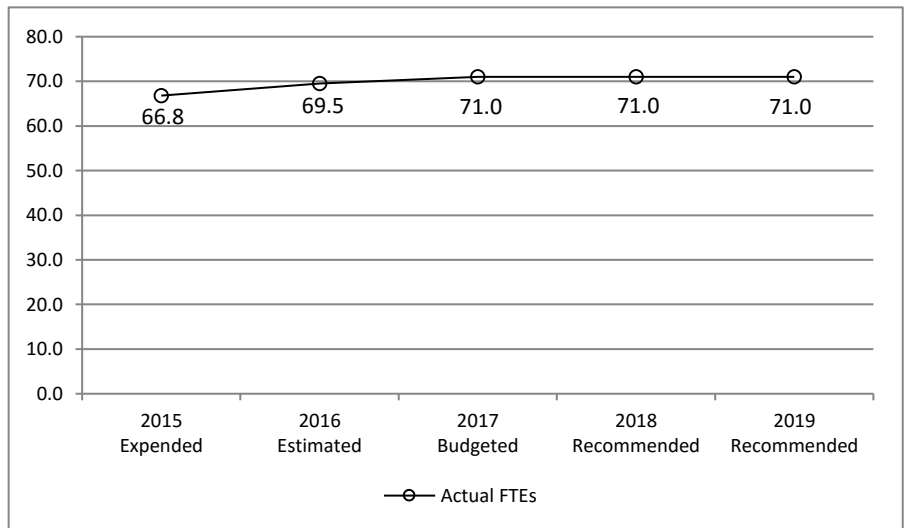

1. **Appellate Court Operations:** Recommendations continue funding and FTE levels for Appellate Court Operations at 2016–17 levels to enable the court to continue to process cases and to maintain average time to disposition for cases at 2016-17 rates. The court included \$0.5 million in General Revenue and authority for 4.0 FTEs for four law clerk positions in its 4 percent reduction.
2. **Judicial Education:** Recommendations provide \$15.6 million in All Funds for Judicial Education. This reflects a \$4.0 million, or 20.5 percent decrease, in General Revenue–Dedicated Judicial and Court Personnel Training Fund No. 540 funds for Judicial Education from 2016–17 levels, court estimated available fund balances, and an annual 2.5 percent decrease in revenues each fiscal year. Recommendations also provide \$0.4 million in General Revenue for the Court to contract with statewide professional associations and other entities for the purpose of providing continuing legal education, courses, and programs for judges and court staff on mental health issues and pre-trial diversion.

The Comptroller's Biennial Revenue Estimate (BRE) anticipates \$16.4 million in revenues and available fund balances for the 2018-19 biennium, which leaves \$0.8 million available for appropriation. Account revenues are drawn from a portion of a court cost assessed upon conviction and a portion of filing fees collected by the 14 Courts of Appeals. Revenues to the account have declined in most fiscal years in amounts ranging from 1.3 to 5.6 percent since fiscal year 2008. (See also, Rider Highlights - House #2, #7, and #8, and Items Not Included in Recommendations - House #1, #3, and #4).

3. **Judicial Compensation Commission:** The Judicial Compensation Commission is recommending a 10.2 percent increase in judicial salaries for the 2018–19 biennium. This would increase the state salary of a Court of Criminal Appeals Judge Justice from \$168,000 to \$185,136 and the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals from \$170,500 to \$187,636. The most recent judicial salary adjustment was a 12.0 percent increase in the 2014–15 biennium for judge and prosecutor positions linked to district judge pay totaling \$34.8 million across the 2014–15 biennium.

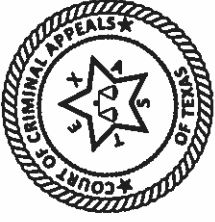

Dear Honorable Members of the House Appropriation Committee,

The Court of Criminal Appeals oversees three separate grants. The first grant is the multi-million dollar education grant for the education of judges, prosecutors, and defense attorneys and their respective staff. The second grant is for training on the topic of innocence exclusively. The innocence grant allows training for judges, prosecutors, defense attorneys, law-enforcement personnel, and law students. The Court's third grant is for the training of public defenders. The Court also hosts its own training initiatives and co-hosts training events with entities such as the Texas Forensic Science Commission and the State Bar. The Court not only audits the funds that are awarded to the various training entities but also plays a large role in overseeing the educational programs offered by our grantees.

While our grantees systematically offer exceptional in-depth training on topics crucial to our system of justice, the Court's oversight of the three state grants extends beyond monitoring programs proposed by the training organizations. Through its unique role as the Supreme Court for criminal cases it is able to address problem areas in the criminal-justice system. The Court works with the grantees to produce an across-the-board approach to educating all participants on issues crucial to the improvement of our criminal-justice system. The Court channels specific educational topics for the improvement of the criminal-justice system to our grantees who in turn educate our constituents through a series of lectures and presentations from state and national experts in fields such as forensic science, eyewitness identification, mental health, discovery, and interrogations.

All of us should take great pride in the knowledge that Texas leads the nation in many of our reforms, particularly in the area of education and training. Other states and several federal organizations have recognized our progress and have asked for our help in

developing their own programs, using Texas as a model. Just a few examples of the national attention we have received has come with invitations from groups such as the Uniform Law Commission, the United States Senate Committee on the Judiciary, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the White House Subcommittee on Forensic Sciences, the American Law Institute, the American Academy of Forensic Sciences, the Innocence Project of New York, the National Commission for Forensic Science, and the Center for Statistics and Applications in Forensic Evidence. Other organizations interested in the Texas training model include the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the Arnold Foundation. Also, Judge Hervey's status as a Commissioner on the National Commission for Forensic Science has allowed for a great exchange of ideas regarding training taking place around the country or those planned for the future.

Some of our educational efforts include a 2009 project the Court worked with the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Office Standards and Education (now TCOLE) to add eyewitness evidence training to the Basic Peace Officer Course curriculum and assisting TCOLE in developing a training course on eyewitness identification procedures modeled after the National Institute of Justice's Eyewitness Evidence Guide. During the 82nd Texas legislative session, a bill was passed that required police departments to adopt and implement written policies for the administration of photograph and live lineup identification procedures that follow best practices. *See* TEX. CODE CRIM. PROC. art. 38.20 (enacted by Acts 82nd Leg., ch. 219 (H.B. 215), § 1, effective September 1, 2011). All law enforcement agencies were required to have their policies in place by September 1, 2012.

The Bill Blackwood Law Enforcement Management Institute of Texas (LEMIT) was charged with the development and dissemination of a model policy and procedure. Those law enforcement departments that have chosen not to adopt the LEMIT model policy were nonetheless charged with drafting their own, which must adhere to the minimum requirements of the statute. All law enforcement groups will be trained on the new eyewitness identification requirements. Because LEMIT was not given specific funding for the educational segment of its work, the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals gave it \$40,000 from grant funds while also awarding \$7,000 to the Texas Police Chiefs Association for law enforcement training. Judges, prosecutors, and defense attorneys have also received training related to the new policy.

As a result of a focused concern of the Legislature two sessions ago, we worked with Senator Carona's office to put on an intensive two-day seminar on mental health and substance abuse. We have also presented two forensic science seminars, one of which we co-sponsored with the Forensic Science Commission. Seminars were taught by state and national experts in various fields, and we educated hundreds of practitioners in key areas. Our grantees not only co-sponsored and advertised these programs, but they have followed up on this training, delivering many more hours of education on these crucial topics across the state.

Most recently the Court engaged in a joint project with the State Bar to begin a "Writ Academy" whereby attorneys could be specially trained to properly handle habeas claims. This is of particular importance due to the woefully inadequate supply of attorneys

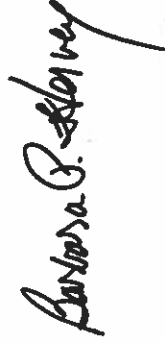
knowledgeable in this area of the law, while the bulk of the work at the Court of Criminal Appeals involves habeas claims. With as many as 400 plus attorneys at a live or simultaneous webinar, the cost was only \$5,000. This is a program we plan to update and continue.

In an ongoing collaboration to address other issued implicated by wrongful convictions, the Court has been working with the Forensic Science Commission to create model discovery orders in cases involving forensic science to reduce the burden on the criminal-justice system (i.e., defense attorneys, prosecutors, and crime-laboratory analysts). The Court has also assisted in the development of a notification system whereby defendants adversely affected by mistakes or other flaws in the forensic science world will have the ability to challenge errors when applicable. The Court has also been working with members of the Legislature and their staff on other ideas and potential bills to strengthen weaknesses in the criminal-justice system.

In the future, the Court plans to further survey prosecutors, defense attorneys, and judges regarding training needs in forensic science and plans on developing a program on the intersection of science and the law.

The grants are well placed within the Court of Criminal Appeals because the Court is in the best position to see the problem areas within the criminal-justice system and areas that may become problematic. And our grantees do not hesitate to deliver training to their respective constituents on topics crucial to the betterment of our system. More training is needed. But sufficient funding is the key to all of this. Therefore, we ask you to seriously consider our requests, share our pride in being national leaders in education, and allow us to continue to further our work.

Overview

For a quick overview, the state appropriation for our program was established by the Texas Legislature in fiscal year 1986 under Chapter 56 of the Texas Government Code. Those provisions allow us to award funding in the form of grants to statewide training entities. At this time most training entities receiving grants are private non-profit organizations rather than governmental entities. We believe this is the only state funded judicial education grant program in the nation, so in that regard we are unique.

Our appropriations run for two years and currently we are in the first year of the FY 2017-18 biennium. The FY 2017 appropriation is in the amount of \$9,779,755, of which \$463,162 is for administration of the program and \$9,316,593 for grant allocations. The grant allocation funds are allocated to the following constituencies:

- \$1,935,938 for appellate, district, and county judges and their court personnel.
- \$1,935,938 for municipal judges and their court personnel.
- \$1,935,937 for justices of the peace and their court personnel, and constables.
- \$438,736 for constitutional county judges.
- \$1,362,392 for prosecuting attorneys and their staff.
- \$1,325,934 for criminal defense lawyers and their staff.
- \$340,385 for specialized training in Actual Innocence.
- \$41,333 for public defender training.

The amount of \$245,000 allocated for Court administration of the program (estimated based on 2016 actual expenses) is used to cover the salaries of a staff attorney (Megan Mollleur) and an auditor (Bill Hill), general office expenses and travel expenses. The amount of \$368,000 (also estimated based on 2016 actual expenses) is allocated for supplemental grants to training entities and other training providers.

LAR Summary

The Court requests the following exceptional items for the Judicial and Court Personnel Training (fund 540) for FY 2018-2019:

Exceptional Item 1:

General Revenue is requested to cover a potential shortfall in Fund 0540 revenues due to declining court fee collections. The trend in declining revenues has averaged 2.5% per year since FY 2007, the net result is an estimated deficit of \$3.99M in total revenues which are necessary to cover the requested appropriation (based on FY 16-17 levels in addition to exceptional item 4 in the amount of \$675k). Without the additional funding to cover the estimated deficit, judicial and court personnel training programs will have to be cut. This will result in less training, and in some cases, no training for judges, court personnel, constables, prosecutors and defense lawyers. It should also be noted that judges and constables have statutorily mandated training requirements at specific numbers of course hours each year. The Court of Criminal Appeals requests General Revenue funding in the amount of \$3.99M (FY 2018 \$1.90M FY 2019 \$2.093M) to cover the estimated revenue shortfall in GR-Dedicated Fund 0540.

97.4% of Fund 0540 revenues are from court fees authorized by Gov't Code Sections 56.001 and 102.021(6), and Local Gov't Code Section 133.102. The trend of an approximate 2.5% decline each year since FY 2007 in said court fees is expected to continue and result in a dire situation whereby revenues are estimated to be insufficient to cover appropriation levels needed to continue Fund 0540 training for judges, court personnel, and attorneys at current levels (FYs 16-17). Without an additional revenue source to cover an estimated shortfall of \$3.997M the Fund 0540 appropriation would have to be decreased by 19.6% [\$3.99M/\$20.38M] which would jeopardize the delivery of required training, much of which is statutorily mandated.

Exceptional Item 3:

Per the State Comptroller's Biennial Revenue Estimate report, at the end of FY 2017 there will be an estimated cash balance of \$639K. The purpose of this exceptional item is to request that the cash balance be made available for funding the Fund 0540 appropriation for the FY 2018-2019 biennium (FY 2018 \$319K FY 2019 \$319K). This increase is particularly important for the funding of the Judicial and Court Personnel Training Program (Fund 0540) because of the anticipated revenue shortfall in the next biennium, which is further addressed in exceptional item 1.

Our estimates indicate a revenue shortfall in Fund 0540 at the end of FY 2019 in the amount of \$3.99M assuming the same appropriation levels as were approved in the FY 2016-2017 biennium are approved for the FY 2018-2019 biennium (in addition to exceptional item 4 which amounts to \$675k, FY 2018 \$337.5k FY 2019 \$337.5k). A shortfall of such magnitude would represent 19.6% [\$3.99M/\$20.38M] of the entire appropriation which would have a detrimental impact on the delivery of training to judges, court personnel, and attorneys, with regards to quantity and quality of training delivered, much of which is statutorily mandated.

Exceptional Item 4:

This exceptional item for \$675k (\$337.5k FY 2018 \$337.5k FY 2019) would be allocated to two training entities. Texas Municipal Courts Education Center would receive \$413k and Texas Justice Court Training Center \$262k over the biennium.

The Texas Municipal Courts Education Center would use the funds to hire a part-time administrative assistant at an estimated cost of \$100k over the biennium which includes salary and benefits, and \$313k for direct training costs including clinics for judges and court personnel to discuss best practices regarding bail, fines, fees, requests for community service, jail commitments, and jail credit in cases involving indigents. Also included in the \$313k is a mentor program for new municipal judges, and webinars on issues relating to legislative reform, bail, indigence, compliance, collections improvement programs, alternative sentencing, case flow management, and jail commitments.

The Texas Justice Court Training Center would use the funds allocated to them to hire a new staff attorney at \$200k over the biennium which includes salary and benefits, and \$62k for training on indigent defendants and mental health. The new staff attorney is needed due to a workload which is already high and increasing. For example, in addition to working with faculty on training programs the staff attorneys provide over 500 hours of judicial training to justices of the peace and their clerks each year, and provide answers to approximately 3,000 legal questions by phone and responses to written questions on the Legal Question Board annually. A new staff attorney would increase the full time equivalents (FTE's) for staff attorneys from 2.9 FTE's to 3.9.

Recent public scrutiny of courts of limited jurisdiction and issues related to bail, fines, fees, and indigence has created a need for additional training on these important issues. In addition, the number of municipal judges and court personnel that participated in training has increased from 4,140 in FY 14 to 5,098 in FY 15, and 5,258 in FY 16. The volume of work required to service the justice courts necessitates an additional staff attorney. Justice courts encompass a large number of judges and vast jurisdiction. This judicial population has approximately a 20% turnover every 4 year election cycle which means a continued need for high quality judicial education. Additional technology requested will help service rural jurisdictions.

The Texas Municipal Courts Education Center (TMCEC) seeks additional funding to expand its programs to respond to important issues facing our criminal justice system in Texas. Recent public scrutiny of courts of limited jurisdiction in terms of issues related to bail, fines, fees, and indigence has created a need for additional training on these important issues. In addition, the number of municipal judges and court support personnel that participate in training from this grant has increased from 4,120 in FY 14 up to 5,327 in FY 16. TMCEC is requesting an additional \$413,000 in grant funding for FY 18-19 (\$164,724.75 in FY 18 and \$248,275.25 in FY 19).

With the current level of funding, in FY 16 the grant provided 65,601 hours of training to 5,327 participants. Using a blended model of live and online programming, annually 42 conferences or seminars are hosted and 20 webinars. A similar training program is planned for FY 17. While the program in the current biennium addresses issues related to mental health, procedural justice, and fines, fees, and costs, a more in-depth approach is in critical need.

The funds will be used for the following proposed activities:

1. Offer each year an additional 10 one-day clinics for judges and court support staff to meet in smaller groups of under 50 to discuss best practices in terms of bail, fines, fees, ordering community service, jail commitments, and jail credit in cases involving indigents. The smaller groups, as opposed to our regional conferences with 100-200 participants, will focus on fundamental court processes to ensure access and fair treatment under Texas laws. (Estimated cost: \$62,695.25 per year)
2. Develop a mentor program for new municipal judges that especially focuses on post-judgment practices to ensure that the rights of all defendants are preserved during compliance with court-ordered fines, fees, and costs. (Estimated cost: \$42,620 per year)
3. Add an additional 10 webinars on fundamental issues related to legislative reform, bail, indigence, compliance, collections improvement programs, alternative sentencing, community service options, case flow management, and jail commitments. (No additional cost)
4. Host a statewide summit in FY 19 to identify new strategies implemented in the courts to effectively meet issues related to bail, fines, fees, and indigence in Texas. Summit will showcase an Effective Practices video that will then be available for the entire TMCEC constituency to watch via the TMCEC website and online learning center. (Estimated cost: \$101,640 only offered once in biennium)
5. Hire a part-time Administrative Assistant to help current TMCEC staff absorb the additional work involved in expanding the program as mentioned above. (Estimated cost: \$50,364.75 per year)

The amount requested by the Texas Municipal Courts Education Center from general revenue for the biennium is \$413,000.

The Texas Justice Court Training Center has three needs that are not able to be met under current funding: an additional staff attorney, an upgraded webinar system, and additional training in key areas.

Staff Attorney

The legal department provides over 500 hours of judicial education to justices of the peace and their clerks every year. The attorneys answer approximately 3000 legal questions through phone calls and in response to written questions on the Legal Question Board annually. They present or create 61 unique courses at the major training events (five 20-hour judges programs and six 16-hour clerks programs) and provide an additional 120 hours of supplemental education through eight 10-hour workshops on specific topics and at least 21 webinars. They prepare resource books on subjects within the justice courts' jurisdiction (e.g. evictions, truancy and juvenile law, magistrature). They work with judges and clerks who serve as faculty to ensure they are effective and prepare or assist in the preparation of their presentations. During legislative years, TJCTC provides a comprehensive overview of the legislation affecting justice courts, including a legislative resource book and eight additional training events. TJCTC provides 80 hours of required new judge training annually. Every four years, the election cycle adds approximately 170 new justices of the peace, which means the judiciary has an ongoing need for continuing judicial education.

TJCTC needs an additional staff attorney to maintain this high level of judicial education and responsiveness to important issues, including indigent defendants, mental health issues, inquests, and courtroom security.

With an additional attorney, the Texas Justice Court Training Center will be able to:

1. Increase our ability to respond to numerous legal questions posed by judges, court personnel and constables by phone and on the Center's Legal Question Board (approximately 3000 answered in the last year);
2. Significantly increase participation in supplemental judicial education events by holding additional seminars in rural jurisdictions for judges, court personnel and constables who would otherwise not be able to attend due to travel budgets or distance;
3. Provide additional webinars to supplement the judicial education at our seminars (we conducted 22 webinars in the past year);
4. Greater flexibility and response time to important new issues when and as they arise, such as the treatment of the indigent defendant, by creating resources and learning modules for immediate use by the courts and their staff;
5. Revise and update essential judicial education resources, including the judges' deskbooks covering all of the many substantive areas within the courts' jurisdiction (e.g. evictions, magistrature, juvenile law, civil trials, criminal trials, inquests, office holding, administrative hearings) and forms for the courts and litigants.
6. Improve monitoring of changes in all of the laws affecting justice courts enacted by the legislature and promptly prepare and distribute Legislative Update materials and presentations so that the judges, court personnel and constables are aware of new laws and procedures before their effective date.

The total biennium cost for an additional staff attorney (with an annual salary no greater than \$70,000.00 and including benefits) is \$200,000.00

Upgraded Webinar Software

TJCTC provides 21 webinars free of charge every year reaching approximately 1200 users. The webinars would continue to be free for the users. The Training Center currently has the most basic of programs. This can lead to technical difficulties and limits the interactivity. We would like to increase the accessibility and participation, particularly for the more rural jurisdictions and those with financial challenges in obtaining judicial education.

An upgraded webinar program, such as Adobe Connect, would have a biennium cost of \$ 13,000.00 for a subscription.

Additional Training Events

The topics of the indigent defendant and mental health are significant and necessary areas in need of additional judicial education. TJCTC proposes providing a 10 hour workshop devoted to each topic annually for a total of 20 hours of additional judicial education for justices of the peace.

The total biennium costs for these programs is \$48,000.00.

In conclusion, the total requested from general revenue for the biennium needs of the Texas Justice Court Training Center is \$261,000.00.

JOB DUTIES OF MEMBERS AND CONSTITUENTS

SUPREME COURT OF TEXAS JUSTICES

- Review actions and decisions of the lower courts on questions of law or allegations of procedural error
- Determine whether to grant review of the final judgment of a court of appeals (i.e., to grant or not grant a petition for review)
- Disposition of regular causes (i.e., granted petitions for review, accepted petitions for writs of mandamus or habeas corpus, certified questions, accepted parental notification appeals, and direct appeals)
- Disposition of numerous motions related to petitions and regular causes answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court
- Issue writs and to conduct proceedings for the involuntary retirement or removal of judges
- Review cases involving attorney discipline upon appeal from the Board of Disciplinary Appeals of the State Bar of Texas

- Promulgates all rules of civil trial practice and procedure, evidence, and appellate procedure
- Promulgates rules of administration to provide for the efficient administration of justice in the state
- Monitors the caseloads of the courts of appeals and orders the transfer of cases between the courts in order to make the workloads more equal
- With the assistance of the Texas Equal Access to Justice Foundation, administers funds for the Basic Civil Legal Services Program, which provides basic civil legal services to the indigent
- Complete continuing education requirements as required by law

TEXAS COURT OF CRIMINAL APPEALS JUDGES

- Hear appeals of appealed death penalty cases
- Mandatory review of applications for post-conviction habeas corpus relief in felony cases without a death penalty
- Hear appeals from the intermediate courts of appeals in criminal cases by petition for discretionary review, which may be filed by the State, the defendant, both, or its own motion.
- Promulgates rules of appellate procedure and rules of evidence for criminal cases
- Administers public funds that are appropriated for the education of judges, prosecuting attorneys, criminal defense attorneys who regularly represent indigent defendants, clerks and other personnel of the state's appellate, district, county-level, justice, and municipal courts
- Complete continuing education requirements as required by law

INTERMEDIATE APPELLATE JUSTICES

- Hear appeals from the trial courts located in its respective district
- Review records from lower court cases that have been appealed to their court
- Hear oral arguments
- Draft opinions
- Complete continuing education requirements as required by law

DISTRICT COURT JUDGES (GENERALLY)

- Adjudicate all criminal cases of the grade of felony and misdemeanors involving official misconduct; divorce cases; suits for title to land or enforcement of liens on land; contested elections; suits for slander or defamation; and suits on behalf of the State for penalties, forfeitures and escheat
- Adjudicate civil matters with a minimum monetary limit (typically \$200,000) but no maximum limit
- May also adjudicate contested matters in probate cases and have general supervisory control over commissioners' courts
- May issue writs of habeas corpus, mandamus, injunction, certiorari, sequestration, attachment, garnishment, and all writs necessary to enforce their jurisdiction
- May appoint, together with other local district judges, county auditor and set auditor's pay
- May appoint purchasing agents in some counties
- If a vacancy occurs in the office of district clerk, may appoint a person to fill the office (with other local district judges)

COUNTY COURT-AT-LAW JUDGE (GENERALLY)

- Jurisdictions vary among CCLs
- Typical criminal jurisdiction includes Class A and B misdemeanors, as well as appeals from Justice of the Peace and Municipal Courts
- Typical civil jurisdiction ranges from controversies of \$500-\$200,000.
- CCLs may, depending on their creating statute, handle probate, juvenile, felony, and more, cases

TRIAL JUDGES – BOTH DISTRICT COURT JUDGES AND COUNTY COURT-AT-LAW JUDGES

- Adopt a plan for indigent representation in criminal and juvenile cases and adopt a fee schedule
- Submit security incident reports to OCA
- Select local administrative judge
- Implement local rules including assignment, docketing and transfer
- Supervise caseload movement
- Provide Supreme Court and Office of Court Administration (OCA) with statistics
- Set hours and place for holding court
- Supervise employment and performance of non-judicial personnel

- Supervise budget and fiscal matters of the local courts
- Coordinate with any other local administrative judges in efficient operation of concurrent cases
- Hire a court coordinator and determine pay; salary is subject to commissioners' approval
- Hire a bailiff
- The district judge or district judges trying criminal cases in each judicial district and the statutory county court judges trying criminal cases in the county or counties served by the judicial district shall establish a Community Supervision and Corrections Department. Tex. Gov't Code §76.002. These judges have authority to (1) approve the Department's budget (2) approve the Community Justice Plan, (3) adopt certain rules regarding contracts with other departments, and (4) appoint a department director.
- Complete continuing education requirements as required by law
- May be responsible for serving on local juvenile board
- May service on county bail bond board
- Hire court reporter and set pay; salary *may be* subject to approval of commissioners' court
- Manage jury procedures
- Appoint interpreters

ASSIGNED AND VISITING JUDGES

- Adjudicate a case or docket of an active judge in the region who is unable to preside or who needs assistance with a heavy docket or docket backlog
- Complete continuing education requirements as required by law

GOVERNMENT CODE CHAPTER 54A ASSOCIATE JUDGES

- Will perform, or assign to be performed, special projects or other duties referred by the District and the County Courts at Law Judges pursuant to 54A, Texas government Code, and Chapter 574, Texas Health and Safety Code.
- Hear cases referred by district and county-level judges
- Make recommendations to the referring court
- Complete continuing education requirements as required by law

FAMILY CODE, CHAPTER 201A ASSOCIATE JUDGES

- Complete continuing education requirements as required by law

- Adjudicate child protection cases

Jury Management (may be delegated to the district clerk by the judges)

- Plan and order each week the summons of jurors adequate for the courts from the standpoint of both economy and efficiency based on each court's schedule and docket
- Divide and assign individual panels to the various courts and plan the re-use and reassignment of jurors to meet each court's needs after qualification of the central panel
- Plan and provide for the comfort and convenience of jurors awaiting assignment.
- Determine answers to complex inquiries from respective jurors
- Plan and coordinate juror security during the trial of major criminal cases
- Maintain records and reports on juror usage for planning and recommended improvements

Docket Management — Criminal

- Maintain and control the master criminal docket for all courts. This includes the setting and preparation of weekly and monthly dockets for each court

Texas District and County Attorneys Duties November 14, 2016

Texas district attorneys, county attorneys, and criminal district attorneys are elected officers who have a constitutional duty to represent the state in all cases in district and inferior courts in their respective districts and counties.¹ Elected prosecutors have a statutory duty to represent the state in all criminal cases in Texas district, county and justice of the peace courts, and generally in the appeals that arise therefrom.² In Texas there are currently 334 elected prosecutors, 2,800 assistant prosecutors, and 2,000 office staff.

Prosecutors significant duties include:

- Prosecute felonies and misdemeanors in district court county court and JP court and appeals therefrom
- Handle juvenile cases
- Represent DFPS/CPS in all aspects of child protection
- Protective orders
- Mental health commitments
- Nuisance enforcement
- Environmental enforcement
- Forfeiture enforcement
- Hot check enforcement
- Civil work for counties

The primary duty of all prosecuting attorneys, including special prosecutors, is not to convict, but to see that justice is done.

The roles of each constituent group and required job duties are described in the TMCEC publication entitled “Role of the Court Clerk,” from the *TMCEC Level I Study Guide*. An excerpt is shown below. This excerpt has been slightly modified to include information about the court administrator and juvenile case manager.

Municipal Judges

The judge is responsible for presiding over trials and other court proceedings, for performing certain magistrate functions, and for the general administration of the court. Municipal judges are public officials.

Judges have the authority to perform judicial, magistrate, and ministerial duties. Judicial duties require an exercise of judgment, a decision of a question of law or fact, or a choice of alternatives. A question of law is an issue involving the application or interpretation of a law. A question of fact is an issue involving resolution of a factual dispute. The choices made by judges must be lawfully available choices or alternatives.

Judicial duties involve the exercise of discretion. “Judicial discretion” is defined as the exercise of judgment by a judge based on what is fair under the circumstances and guided by the rules and principles of law. A judge’s discretion to make decisions must be based on facts and guided by law. It is the power to determine what, under existing circumstances, is right or proper. Judicial discretion is not unrestrained, though, and must be exercised so as to give effect to the purpose of the law for the interest of justice.

In the capacity of a trial court judge, the judge must be impartial and ensure that justice is done. The judge is not an adversary and must decide questions only on the basis of law. He or she must never assume the role of prosecutor or of defense counsel nor act as a special advisor to the police or a rubber stamp for law enforcement. The judge must never be influenced by the city to produce revenue or to enforce laws selectively.

When cases proceed to trial, only the evidence presented and the applicable laws are legitimate bases for any judicial decision. Accordingly, the judge must allow the prosecution and the defense, as well as all other components of the system, to perform their duties vigorously, but always within the limits allowed by law.

All judges in Texas are magistrates. Art. 2.09, C.C.P. Magistrate authority is additional power granted by the Texas Legislature. Although magistrate duties are broad and scattered throughout various statutes and codes, the general duty of every magistrate is to preserve the peace within his or her jurisdiction by issuing process intended to help prevent and suppress crime and to initiate the arrest of offenders in order that they may be brought to punishment. Art. 2.10, C.C.P. Magistrates act as the gatekeeper to the criminal justice system.

Case law provides that a magistrate's authority is countywide. *Gilbert v. State*, 493 S.W.2d 783 (Tex. Crim. App. 1973). In the municipal setting, a mayor is also a magistrate, but a mayor who is not acting as an ex officio municipal judge can only perform magistrate duties and not judicial duties.

The judge will rely heavily on administrative support by the clerk, but may not delegate judicial duties to the clerk or allow the clerk to influence any judicial decisions. While the judge establishes judicial policy and general court procedures, the clerk helps to implement those policies and procedures. Despite the close working relationship between the judge and clerk, there must be a clear separation between judicial and administrative functions.

Judicial Duties that May Not Be Delegated

The list below, although not exhaustive, sets out judicial duties that may not be delegated to a clerk.

- Setting bail to secure the defendant's appearance after a case has been filed in municipal court (Article 45.016, C.C.P.)
- Issue arrest warrants for defendants whose cases are filed in municipal court (Article 45.014, C.C.P.)
- Issue a capias for a defendant after a charge has been filed in municipal court (Article 23.04, C.C.P.)
- Issue a summons for a defendant when requested by the prosecutor (Article 23.04, C.C.P.)
- Issue a summons for the parent of a person under 17 (Articles 45.0215 and 45.054, C.C.P.)
- Forfeit bail (Articles 4.14 and 45.044, C.C.P.; Section 29.003(e), G.C.)
- Take and accept pleas of guilty, nolo contendere, or not guilty (Articles 27.14, 27.16, 45.021, 45.0215, 45.022, and 45.024, C.C.P.; Attorney General Opinion H-386)
- Enter a plea of not guilty for a defendant who refuses to plead (Article 45.024, C.C.P.)
- Grant a motion for new trial made after a defendant entered a plea while detained in jail (Article 45.023, C.C.P.)

- Conduct pre-trial hearings (Article 28.01, C.C.P.)
- Grant continuances (Chapter 29, C.C.P.)

Court Clerks and Court Administrators

Court clerks look to the judge for direction in matters pertaining to overall court policy and judicial procedures. The clerk's primary responsibilities include processing the clerical work of the court; administering daily operations of the court; maintaining court records; coordinating the scheduling of cases; and performing other duties as may be outlined in the city charter or ordinances. In the absence of more detailed, written administrative duties for a clerk by the governing body, the judge may assign various administrative duties. The court clerk is required to "keep minutes of the proceedings of the court, issue process and generally perform the duties for the municipal court that a county clerk performs for the county court." Sec. 29.010(c), G.C.

The court clerk can have a tremendous impact on participants' perceptions of the justice system. Each participant has a right to know and understand the court's procedures, thus the clerk should provide participants with information on court procedures while avoiding giving legal advice.

The responsibility of the court clerk's position and the scope of duties have greatly increased in recent years. The professionalism, timeliness, and accuracy of the court clerk's actions are important to the proper operation of the municipal court.

The court clerk must fulfill all duties impartially and competently. Within the role of administratively assisting the court as a whole, the court clerk is responsible for seeing that the court's papers are accurate, orderly, and complete. While the clerk's duty is to serve all participants equally in the legal system, the clerk must remain independent of any particular participant. This means that the clerk must be as courteous and helpful to defense lawyers as prosecutors and to defendants as police officers. The clerk must never attempt to influence the outcome of any case.

Some municipal courts in Texas utilize the term "court administrator" instead of court clerk. This usually applies to larger and medium size courts where there are multiple deputy court clerks, thus requirement more supervision and management.

Prosecutors

The Code of Criminal Procedure provides that it is the primary duty for municipal court prosecutors not to convict but to see that justice is done. Art. 45.201, C.C.P. In the broad view, the prosecutor represents the public's interest in enforcing the criminal laws of the state while acting in a manner that maintains public respect for the system. This is often a balancing act for prosecutors seeking to see justice fairly administered while operating within an adversarial system.

All prosecutions in municipal court shall be conducted by the city attorney or deputy city attorney. Some cities have in-house city attorneys and others contract with solo practitioners or law firms. In this regard, the municipal prosecutor is unique in the Texas justice system in that the prosecutor may practice an entirely different type of law, even criminal defense, when not acting in the role of the municipal court's prosecutor. The prosecutor may also be the county attorney of the county in which the municipality is situated if the county attorney so desires. In this case, the county attorney is not entitled to receive any compensation.

From a practical standpoint, prosecutors decide which cases to pursue, meet with opposing counsel or pro se defendants, and conduct trials. Article 45.201 of the Code of Criminal Procedure only requires an attorney representing the State to be present to conduct prosecutions at bench or jury trials. Tex. Att'y. Gen. Op. GA-0067 (2003). Thus, interestingly, prosecutors may be present, but are not required when a defendant makes an appearance to enter a plea.

Just as municipal court clerks perform many of the same duties as their counterparts at the county and district levels, the city prosecutor performs a similar role as the prosecuting attorney in other criminal trial courts. A big difference is that county and district court prosecutors typically have distinct case intake protocols and may have staff and clerks of their own assisting in case preparation. In many Texas cities, the municipal prosecutor will not have as vast a support network. The prosecutor's time for case preparation and consultation with police officers, witnesses, and complainants is also usually more limited than their counterparts in the higher courts due in part to the greater case volume in municipal court.

The prosecutor ultimately represents the State of Texas when appearing in municipal court. To this end, the prosecutor's role is to seek justice, to screen out or to ask for dismissal of cases where there is insufficient evidence or evidence wrongfully gathered, and to seek convictions fairly and only of the guilty. It is solely the prosecutor's duty to decide when to file a complaint or advise peace officers in case preparation. Prosecutors, however, should be mindful that they cannot dismiss charges or cases, except upon written grounds and with the judge's approval. Arts. 45.201 and 32.02, C.C.P.

Duties of a municipal prosecutor include:

- investigate the facts surrounding alleged offenses and decide whether to file charges;
- prepare and draft complaints (the clerk may assist the prosecutor in preparing routine complaints where that preparation is a ministerial duty; however, the ultimate responsibility for the legal sufficiency and accuracy of complaints belongs to the prosecutor);
- administer oaths to persons filing complaints before the court (Art. 45.019(e), C.C.P.);

- prepare and present the State's case at trial;
- arrange for the appearance of the State's witnesses, including requests for subpoenas and attachments;
- file motions with the court that may be necessary to present cases;
- request dismissal of cases under proper circumstances;
- advise the police department in case preparation, legal procedures, and requirements, and other legal questions; and
- discuss pending cases with defendants or, if represented by counsel, with their attorneys prior to the courtroom hearing.

With the county attorney's consent or assistance, prosecutors are statutorily allowed to prosecute cases on appeal out of a municipal court. Art. 45.201, C.C.P. The prosecutor may make arrangements with the county attorney or criminal district attorney and the county judge to prosecute municipal court appeals.

Bailiffs

Ultimately, the judge has responsibility for maintaining order in his or her courtroom. Section 21.001(b) of the Government Code provides that "a court shall require that proceedings be conducted with dignity and in an orderly and expeditious manner and control the proceedings so that justice is done." It is, therefore, up to the judge to ensure that all users of the court are afforded safe and orderly proceedings. This is an impossible task to administer alone, however, so judges rely on the court bailiff to help.

The bailiff is directly responsible to the judge and has the duty of maintaining order, security, and decorum while the court is in session. The bailiff generally opens and closes court sessions. He or she may be assigned other duties, including maintaining custody of and escorting those convicted to the clerk to arrange payment. Bailiffs also administer oaths to witnesses (if directed and authorized by the judge); attend to the jury, keeping them together and separate from all other citizens during deliberations; carry written communications between the jury and the judge; and inform the judge when a verdict has been reached. Bailiffs may also assist defendants and other citizens present by explaining court procedures and answering questions.

Warrant Officers and Marshals

It is the duty of every peace officer to preserve the peace within the officer's jurisdiction through the use of all lawful means. Art. 2.13, C.C.P. Peace officers engage in various law enforcement duties when arresting offenders without a warrant (i.e., issuing a citation or making a custodial

arrest for an offense committed in view), applying to a magistrate for an arrest warrant when the officer has probable cause to believe a person has committed an arrest, and executing lawful process issued to the officer by a magistrate or a judge.

The primary role of the warrant officer is to serve all processes or papers issued by a municipal court; in other words, to make arrests on warrants or capias pro fines or deliver summonses to the parties to whom they are addressed. The Code of Criminal Procedure provides that all process issuing out of the municipal court shall be served by a police officer or city marshal under the same rules that apply to service by sheriffs and constables of process issuing out of justice court. Art. 45.202, C.C.P. Failure, neglect, or refusal to serve process may make the responsible officer liable for a fine of \$10 to \$200 for contempt of court. Art. 2.16, C.C.P.

Some cities have city marshal departments that work under the court; often, the court administrator is the chief administrator of the law enforcement agency that is the marshal's office. In most cities, the duty to serve process is often assigned to the police department and sometimes to those specially designated as warrant officers. As peace officers, warrant officers must comply with the minimum educational, training, physical, mental, and moral standards established by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE).

Juvenile Case Managers

A juvenile case manager provides services in cases involving juvenile offenders before a court consistent with the court's statutory powers. Juvenile case managers assist the court in administering the court's juvenile docket and in supervising its orders in juvenile cases. Juvenile case managers timely report any information or recommendations relevant to assisting the judge in making decisions that are in the best interest of the child. Juvenile case managers guide juvenile offenders through the justice system by helping them obtain needed services in hopes that their intervention will deter young offenders from committing more crimes. Juvenile case managers often use case management plans to help identify the community services, such as drug and alcohol counseling, tutoring, crisis intervention, family counseling, parenting skills, youth coping skills training, and youth mentoring. Juvenile case managers serve as liaisons between young offenders, their families, the courts, the schools in truancy cases, and other agencies in a municipality's juvenile justice program.

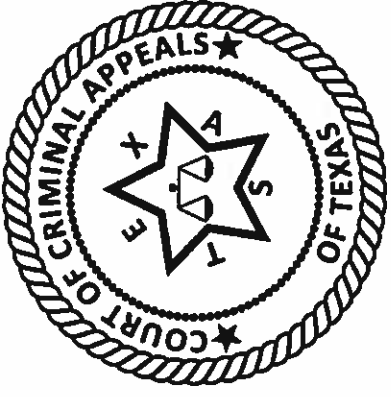

CCA Grant – Fund 540 FY2018 Proposed Grant Reduction

The Texas Center has a grant award totaling \$1,920,938 from the CCA for FY2017. If the grant award for FY2018 were to be reduced by 19.6% then the total award amount would be \$1,544,434.15, a reduction of \$376,503.85.

The Texas Center's administrative expenses are not subject to change: salaries and other benefits are capped based, in large part, on a 2002 salary study and the office lease and other office expenses are fixed by contract. Cuts in expenses to accommodate a 19.5% budget reduction would more than likely come from cancelling educational conferences.

Based on the FY2017 budget the Texas Center would be able to reduce expenses in FY2018 by \$355,820 by cancelling the Criminal Justice conference, the Civil Justice conference, the College for New Judges – Part II, and the Professional Development Program (PDP) conference for court personnel. The remaining cuts in expenses would come from a reduction in attendance at the College for New Judges conference held in December 2017.

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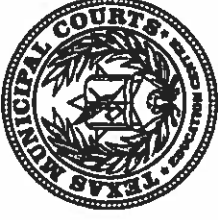

Effect of Reduction in Funding on TMCEC Programming in FY 18-19

On average, TMCEC trains 5,300 people per year. In FY 2016, TMCEC provided statewide 65,601 hours of instruction to court personnel. A reduction in funding means TMCEC will be forced to cut training by over 950 participants to an estimated 4,350 court and court related personnel (a total reduction of 17,264 hours) per year.

Currently, TMCEC creates specialized curriculum for each of its six municipal court workgroup constituencies: (1) judges, (2) clerks, (3) court administrators, (4) bailiffs, marshals & warrant officers, (5) juvenile case managers, and (6) prosecutors. The curriculum for each constituency also contains core curriculum which is critical to ensuring continuity and the proper, timely, and professional performance of court related duties and operation of the state's municipal courts.

The reduction in funding, detailed below, will negatively impact the fair and efficient administration of Texas municipal courts in the next biennium.

Subject to approval of the Board of Directors and the Court of Criminal Appeals, a 19.6 percent reduction in funding would result in the following:

1. Elimination of the Administrative Assistant position due to the reduction in programming (-\$66,777.60).
2. Elimination of Temporary Support Services due to the reduction in programming (-\$30,000).
3. Reduction of Committee Travel (-\$20,485.74) including meals, transportation, lodging, and meeting room rentals.
4. Elimination of all Out of State Travel (-\$5,620.72).
5. Elimination of specialized and core curriculum instruction for: (1) court administrators (-\$102,487), (2) juvenile case managers (-\$73,934), (3) bailiff & warrant officers (-\$93,368). No other federal, state or local organization provides continuing education to these three municipal court workgroup constituencies.
6. Elimination of the 32-hour new clerk program for newly hired or inexperienced court clerks (-\$324,395.62).
7. Elimination of all one-day clinics (clinics that offer more in-depth programs or reach non-metropolitan areas where court support personnel can attend at reduced local cost (-\$36,819.02) (includes Local Clerk Clinics and One Day Clinics for all municipal court workgroup constituencies).
8. Elimination of scholarships for faculty and staff to attend judicial education programs from national groups that bring back new strategies and approaches for incorporation into the TMCEC program (-\$5,000).

ECONOMIC IMPACT OF BUDGET CUTS ON JUSTICE COURT EDUCATION

Eliminations of court personnel education.

TJCTC provides live education to at least 1200 of the approximate 3500 justice court clerks every year. There is a waiting lists of over a hundred clerks attempting to get into our programs. These individuals are the first point of contact for the heavily pro se population that justice courts serve. Court clerks process most of the case and their knowledge of procedures is essential to fair and accurate justice. Six court personnel education seminars would be eliminated.

Elimination of at least one staff member.

TJCTC has a small, but efficient staff of 9 people. At least one of these people would lose their job with the reduction to the operating budget.

Partnerships with important organizations.

TJCTC takes the opportunity to work with groups, like the Texas Indigent Defense Commission, to provide education on important topics. With a cut in funds, these partnerships could not continue.

Supplemental education.

TJCTC provides workshops on targeted justice court issues, such as evictions and juvenile law. With a decrease in funds, TJCTC would be unable to provide these or any other specialized programs.



Texas District and County Attorneys Association

Top three TDCAA projects in need of funding in the future:

1. In response to our study of issue surrounding prosecutorial misconduct, we began an initiative to develop a whole new type of training on management and leadership. The purpose of this training is to develop a culture of the highest ethical standards in prosecutor offices. We have piloted one program and will pilot one more soon, but the demand is great and right now we don't have the funding needed to replicate this training on a larger scale.
2. We have long range goals to develop more distance learning opportunities for our members, but resources aren't there yet.
3. We anticipate a need to training/retrain our lawyers and DPFS lawyers on CPS cases. This could be a big commitment over and above our current training.

Services identified for reductions if needed:

1. TDCAA produces annual courses on subjects such as sexual assault of a child, child abuse, domestic violence, evidence, forensic science. A prospective reduction in funding would require us to delete two or more course from our rotation.



Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association

Dear Judge Hervey,

In response to your question about the impact to the Criminal Defense Lawyers Project if we took a loss of grant funds of approximately 19.6%, we estimate this would be approximately \$256,000 in grant funds per year.

We currently have planned 48 CLE programs and 75 online CLE programs for the period inquired about. If we lost 19.6% of the grant, we would have to cut our training to 32 or fewer programs and no online CLE's. We estimate that we would train 2,300 lawyers, approximately 700 fewer than the past year, including 100 less public defenders and less individuals trained in Innocence. We would also have 81 less faculty at our training events.

A \$263,000 reduction in funding would cause the loss of at least two full time and three-part time staff.

We believe this would have a devastating impact on our ability to train criminal defense lawyers who take indigent cases. We believe it would have a negative impact on Justice in Texas.

On a far brighter note, we sincerely appreciate your asking us to submit a list of what additional items we would like to pursue in FY 2018-2019.

We would respectfully want to state that we would have concerns if these additional funds were paid for by increased court costs borne by our clients, especially indigent clients. We would hope the increase in fees would be on the civil side.

- 1) Immigration Consequences - which is more than just about deportation, but could include all the things that might negatively affect our clients like losing state benefits. There are dozens or more potential consequences for convictions and even deferred in some situations. This would help reduce instances of IAC.
Cost \$10,000
- 2) Expanded Mental Health training that is very needed. Cost \$10,000
- 3) Additional Forensics having two programs a year or have a forensic topic where feasible in more CDLP CLE. Cost \$20,000
- 4) Initiate "on your feet" training format, not long and complicated fact patterns like the Tim Evans Criminal Trial College, but perhaps a one-day or afternoon we work with lawyers on predicate questions and then get them up to try introducing something from Facebook, or a document, photo etc. Cost \$10,000

Total additional funds request \$50,000.

We appreciate all you have done for TCDLA. Our hope is that the deficit will be not occur.
We look forward to working with you for Justice in Texas.

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Request for Program Expansion

The Texas Association of Counties (TAC) is respectfully requesting additional education funding for our County Judges Education Program. We can easily identify three areas of judicial education that need more intensive training for our county judges. These areas are:

1. **Guardianships** – much attention is being directed to the handling of guardianship cases by county judges in Texas. Last session a number of pieces of legislation were offered, aimed at revamping the way guardianship cases are granted and administered. This is one of the few areas of the law where a judge has indefinite continuing jurisdiction and oversight. The judge is responsible for annual accounts and reports for the remainder of the life of the person under guardianship unless the guardianship is discontinued. After the guardianship is terminated, the judge must ensure that proper final accountings are made. Some of the legislation from last session passed. We expect more to pass this session. The Office of Court Administration is also promoting multiple changes to the guardianship system. Addressing the needs of the county judges and county clerks affected by the previous and expected changes is requiring numerous additional small group trainings and hands on assistance.

2. **Mental Health** – the number of mental health cases our county judges handle each year continues to grow. County judges are often tasked with signing Emergency Detention Orders at all hours of the day and night. The county judge then also has original jurisdiction to hear Applications for Mental Services and Applications for the Administration of Psychotropic Medications. With the lack of hospital beds for these individuals and limited resources, county judges need more in depth training on the process for mental health commitments, how to handle inmates with mental health issues and any alternatives that might be available.
3. **Magistration** – county judges share magistration duties with Justices of the Peace in most Texas counties. As Texas looks to make changes to the magistration process, including looking at alternatives to traditional bonds and new possible conditions for bond, we need to be able to provide hands on training to our judges on not only the anticipated changes in the law, but also the implementation and application of these changes. Added to this is the new requirements for screening and identifying mental health issues during the magistration process.



Impact of Potential Funding Cuts

Historically, TAC has provided two 16 hour education sessions for county judges. These sessions were designed so a county judge could attend the one session and obtain all of their required hours on a variety of topics pertaining to their courtrooms for the year. We also host several smaller four hour sessions at different conferences and regional roundtables to provide more targeted education to groups of judges.

In 2015 TAC responded to the growing concerns expressed by county judges that they were not getting the information they needed from probate schools sponsored by other organizations. Only 10% of the county judges in Texas are trained attorneys. A large number of the judges felt other probate trainings were not practical for non-attorney judges; this concern was also reiterated by the county judges who are licensed to practice law. County judges are the court of original jurisdiction in Texas for probate and guardianship cases. Typically, probate and guardianships are also the most complicated cases most county judges hear. Understanding this, TAC developed our own Probate Academy, designed by county judges and county clerks to meet their specific needs.

The Probate Academy has been a great success, averaging 220 attendees each of the first two years it has been held. However, it is also an expensive venture due to its size and content. If we are faced with a funding cut, the Probate Academy would have to be discontinued. Cutting this program would not completely close the gap. The

remainder of the deficit would have to be addressed by ceasing reimbursements to county judges for attending any non-TAC sponsored program. This would mean that we only reimburse a county judge up to \$750 per year for travel and meals to attend either our Spring or Fall 16 hour session and to allow us sufficient funding to host New Judges School every fourth year for the judges that are new to the office.

We have examined our budget closely. We only have three full-time employees working in Judicial Education (a Judicial Program Manager, a Project Manager and a Project Coordinator), cutting personnel would not be a viable option. Our budget is training intensive, meaning is where the cuts would unfortunately have to occur.

Thank you for considering the specific needs of county judges. We serve a very different audience than most other programs. County Judges in many cases are the only judge in their county with Probate and Class A and B misdemeanor jurisdiction. Combining that with their lack of legal background, the challenges and educational needs are great. We are happy to provide any additional information you might need.



County and District Clerks

For efficiency purposes, a request has been made for TAC to take over the administration of the County and District Clerk grant funds and provide training reimbursements to the county and district clerks. County and District Clerks have an extremely wide spectrum of mandated responsibilities, which are continuously changing. To effectively carry out their duties, they must attend multiple trainings each year. County budgets are more constrained than ever. The first item cut in most county budgets is training. County and District Clerks rely on the reimbursements from their grant to help them meet their training needs each year. A reduction of their reimbursement funds from \$175,000 to \$140,000 a year would severely limit the reimbursement program. This would mean that many clerks would not have access to the trainings they need. They would be further impacted by the elimination of the Probate Academy, which provides 16 hours of continuing education developed specifically for their needs.

CAIL's Response discussing the impact of a 19.6% cut in our grant funds

As you know, we have a criminal law grant, an innocence grant, and a grant to support public defender attendance at programs. A 19.6% reduction would mean a loss of approximately \$65,000 annually in the criminal grant, a loss of about \$28,400 in the innocence grant, and a reduction of about \$2,160 in public defender reimbursements. Assuming other numbers stay constant, cuts of this amount could mean:

For the criminal grant, we currently offer 8 programs during the grant year. To accommodate a 19.6% cut, we could drop our most expensive program (the Capital Defense College with a non-staff budget of about \$35,500) and one of our important but smaller programs (Evidence Boot Camp, Cross-Examination and Impeachment, or Capital Trial Voir Dire, which have budgets ranging from about \$12,900-\$15,400). We might also need to make other small adjustments. Wendy Castellana directs our criminal grant programs, and this paragraph incorporates suggestions from her.

For the innocence grant, we could delete all participant meal functions or eliminate one of our larger programs (for example, our 2-day summer program that is budgeted at about \$13,400). We currently offer 4 programs annually in Plano plus a series of webinars and on-the-road programs. Since our webinars are replays of some of our live programs, if we cut the 2-day summer program, that would also mean we would lose one of the webinars the following year.

In addition, our 2017 budget increases one staff assistant from part-time to full-time. That person works for both the criminal and innocence grants, in addition to some work for CAIL. A 19.6% budget reduction in our grants would mean a return to the part-time position and a reduction in time, rate of pay and benefits.

Finally, for our public defender (PD) grant, all monies are used to reimburse expenses for PDs who attend our grant programs, and we would need to reduce those reimbursements.

These are rough estimates and are examples of what might happen. If we were actually faced with a 20% cut, we would want to re-think our overall budget to determine how best to weather the cut.

CAIL's Response identifying subjects which could benefit from additional training funds

In response to your request to identify the top three pressing subjects to which we would devote additional training funds, here is information from CAIL.

We are a somewhat unique grantee since we do separate criminal law programs for defense lawyers and prosecutors, in addition to innocence programs for a mixed audience. In general, we have identified one topic for defense lawyers, one for prosecutors and one for our innocence audience. In the last paragraph, we mention a fourth topic that continues to be very important.

1. Severe mental illness. This program would be aimed at defense lawyers and would focus on how to handle clients who suffers from severe mental illness. It could also address the impact of mental illness on culpability.
2. Management/leadership training for prosecutors. This subject was mentioned by both prosecutors who responded to our survey. Prosecutors are often promoted based on trial skills and may enter supervisory positions without management training or well-developed management skills.
3. Advanced training on cognitive and implicit bias and tunnel vision (for our innocence audience).

In addition, Brady/Michael Morton Act training continues to be quite important, both for prosecutors (and their lab and law enforcement personnel) and for our actual innocence audiences.

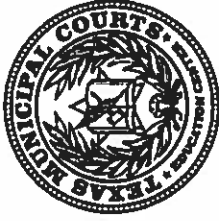

TMCEC Mental Health Training Municipal Judges

Municipal judges encounter individuals with mental illness in their capacity as judges and as magistrates. As a manifestation of their illness, these individuals often commit non-violent Class C misdemeanors, sometimes repeatedly. Magistrates perform their duties for the growing number of mentally ill defendants entering Texas jails. While TMCEC has consistently offered training on mental health issues concerning defendants and the statutory duties of and resources available to municipal judges and magistrates, we gave special and expansive attention to the topic in fiscal years 2015 and 2016.

TMCEC held a one-day clinic on February 27, 2015 entitled *Mental Health Issues and Procedures in Municipal Courts*. The sessions were as follows:

- Behavioral Health Issues and Crisis Services for Adults and Juveniles
- Post Traumatic Stress Disorder
- Mental Health Warrants
- Hoarding

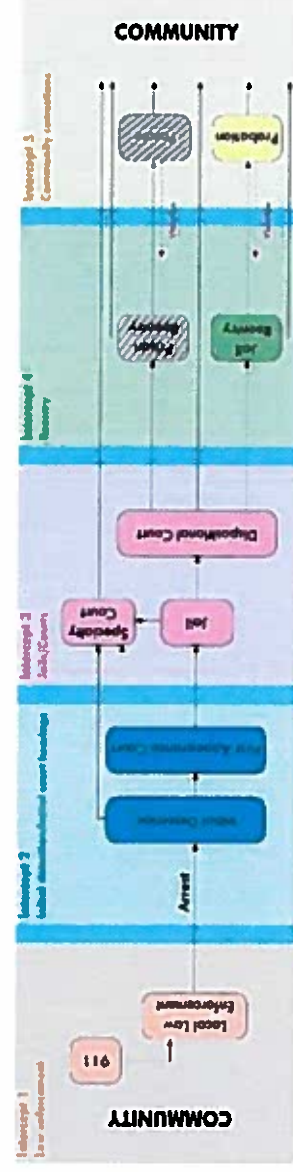
On August 20, 2015, TMCEC hosted a planning meeting attended by multiple stakeholders in the fields of mental health and criminal justice. The purpose of the planning meeting was to collect viewpoints, identify the roles and necessary collaboration involved as defendants with mental illness encounter and flow through the criminal justice system, and to plan a future mental health summit for municipal judges and prosecutors. Using the fruit of that planning meeting, we hosted our first *Mental Health Summit* on May 9-11, 2016. The intent of this summit was to generate judicial and prosecutorial leadership, equipping and inspiring participants to better serve individuals with mental illness and lead their communities in improving the quality of the administration of justice in Texas. The sessions were as follows:

- Stepping Up: National and Texas Momentum to Reduce the Number of Mentally Ill Persons in Jail

- Fundamentals of Mental Illness: Understanding Mental Health Issues and Their Impact on Court Proceedings
- Military Informed Care
- Realities and Myths of Cases with Mentally Ill Defendants
- Developing Criminal Justice-Mental Health Partnerships
- Crisis Intervention Teams
- Magistrate Decision-Making in Cases Involving Mental Health Issues: Duties, Liabilities, and Authorities
- Community Strategies for Responding to Individuals with Mental Illness
- Identifying, Screening, and Assessing Individuals with Co-Occurring Disorders in Municipal Courts
- Make the Connection: Mental Health Services and Support
- In Our Own Voice: A Presentation by the National Alliance on Mental Illness – Austin Affiliate

Building on the summit, we solicited applications for a *Sequential Intercept Model (SIM) Mapping Workshop*, facilitated by Policy Research Associates, and hosted by TMCEC, to be held on August 30, 2016. Policy Research Associates operate SAMHSA's GAINS Center for Behavioral Health and Justice Transformation. We selected Tarrant County, the point person being Ann Collins, a municipal judge in Fort Worth. That county has formed a core group of mental health and criminal justice representatives, the Tarrant County Criminal Justice Coordinating Committee. Representatives from that committee along with a peer representative who is in recovery and assists with peer recovery services will plan the workshop under the guidance of TMCEC and Policy Research Associates. The goal of the workshop is to develop a map that illustrates how people with behavioral health needs come in contact with and flow through the criminal justice system. Key stakeholders will learn how to create a local "systems map" utilizing the framework of the Sequential Intercept Model and establish priorities and opportunities through a strategic planning process.

The Sequential Intercept Model



During the SIM workshop, opportunities and resources will be identified for diverting people out of the criminal justice system at various intercepts along the Sequential Intercept Model and into appropriate behavioral health services. As part of the mapping process, critical gaps in services will be identified and summarized. Based on the mapping exercise and identified service gaps, opportunities for systems change and practice improvement will be identified. Participants will determine areas where immediate steps will result in a more cohesive, integrated approach to service delivery, and a local set of priorities for change will be established. The convening of this group will become a role model of what other courts and communities can do to address the needs of those with mental illness in the criminal justice system.

TMCEC also hosted a one-day mental health clinic on February 26, 2016: *Mental Health Tools and Community Models for Municipal Court Judges and Prosecutors*. The sessions were as follows:

Clerks' Regional Programs (FY 14 – 16):

More people come into contact with municipal courts than all of the other courts in the Texas criminal justice system. As a result, court personnel have contact with an incredibly broad cross-section of the general public, some of which may have mental health issues. Court personnel must find ways to work with these individuals and process their cases while respecting due process and rights guaranteed by the Constitution. This is complicated by the fact that defendants at this level are majority pro se. Although there are provisions in the law for the appointment of counsel in municipal court proceedings, these provisions have very specific requirements and are not typically applied to defendants throughout the state.

Furthermore, a prosecutor may have no opportunity to ascertain the existence of a mental illness or other psychiatric or psychological issue unless the defendant has previously entered a plea of not guilty. Specialized training in handling non-capital cases where mental health is an issue is presented to Public Defenders and others representing indigent defendants at Indigent Defense Seminars and Public Defender Trainings. Mental health topics are included as needed in the twelve traveling theme seminars conducted around the state.

TCDLA also conducts a seminar dedicated to mental health issues faced by veterans. The purpose of these seminars and events is to bring a broad spectrum of quality training to lawyers in as many parts of the state as possible.

These mental health themed seminars prepare attendees to represent clients with mental illness, in DWI, family violence and felony offenses. The seminars are designed to teach thorough and effective investigation of the facts of the case and the psycho-social history of the client and presenting the same.

CDLP selects speakers and course directors who are actively involved in representing clients with mental health issues and experts in mental health treatment. Presenters of mental health topics include attorneys, psychiatrists, psychologists, mitigators and other investigators, whose presentations prepare attendees to successfully represent indigent clients.

Scientific research continues to develop new methods to investigate crimes and crime scenes and to uncover fallacies in older, once-approved, techniques of investigation. In an effort to ensure that indigent clients aren't convicted based on "junk science" or the improper application of truly scientific procedures, CDLP puts on programs around the state on forensic topics.

The annual Forensics program covers topics including DNA collection, testing and interpretation; blood spatter analysis; eye witness identification; ballistics testing and many others in plenary, half-plenary and break-out formats. This program, which has been produced for 15 years, is the cornerstone of the CDLP science programs. Speakers have included the molecular biologist who assisted in Amanda Knox's exoneration, the former DPS DNA expert who blew the whistle on Houston Crime lab errors, and the ballistics expert who blew the whistle on shortcuts being taken by FBI labs. This program has also featured the presentation of a video produced especially to highlight forensic topics being taught that year and the conduct of a comparative arson burn which demonstrated how "flash over" produced burn patterns which had been misidentified as pour marks by investigators in the past.

CDLP also puts on training which focuses on issues in innocence cases. These programs usually provide for specific training of law students which innocence projects often employ as interns to assist in investigation.

In the past year, media accounts have detailed the treatment of indigent persons by the criminal justice system, especially with respect to those charged with or convicted of fine-only misdemeanors. For an indigent person, discharging fines, fees, and court costs may seem insurmountable. 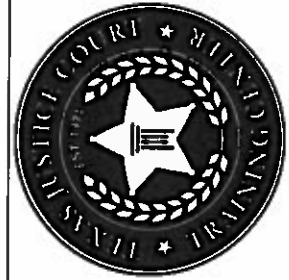

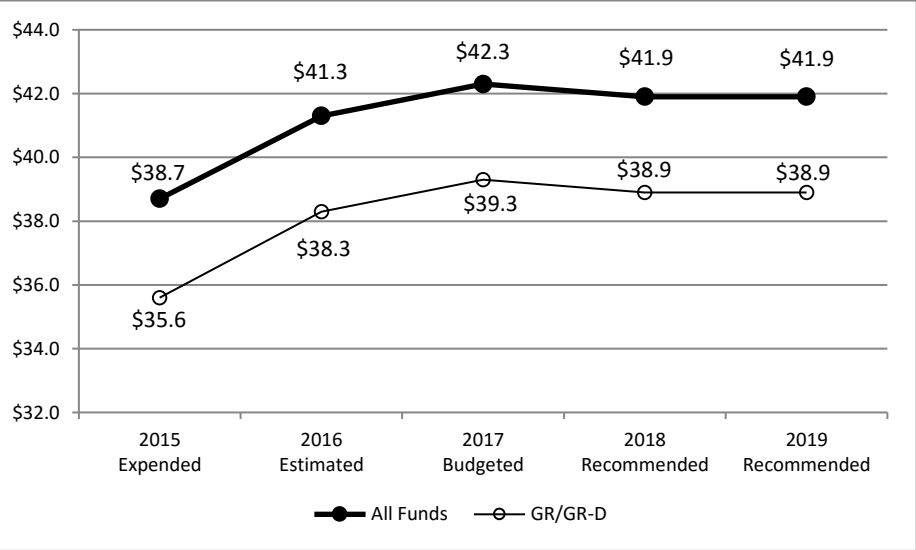

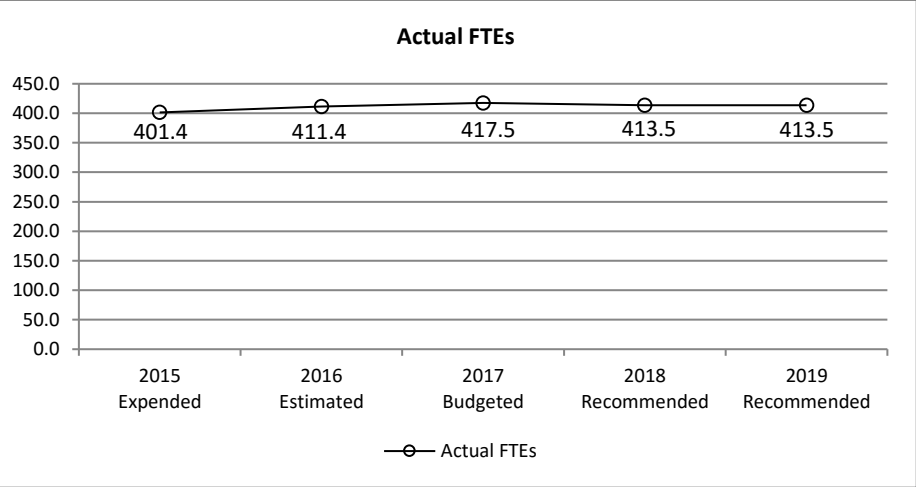

Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - House

1. **Appellate Court Operations:** Recommendations continue \$3.1 million in General Revenue with authority for 24.5 FTEs for the Appellate Court Operations strategies for the 14 Courts of Appeals to maintain the court’s clearance rates at or above 100 percent. This includes continuing the Twelfth Court of Appeals, Tyler, at 2016–17 appropriated levels by including operational funds that were lapsed in 2016–17. The four percent reduction would have included the following:
- 1) 13 staff attorneys

2) Transitioning 1 staff attorney from a full-time to a part-time position

3) 2 Deputy Clerks

4) Transitioning 2 deputy clerks from full-time to part-time positions

5) 4 Administrative positions

6) 4 Law Clerk positions
2. **14 Courts of Appeals Caseloads and Clearance Rates:** The number of cases filed amongst the 14 Courts of Appeals has been steadily declining, resulting in a 10 percent decrease in new cases added since fiscal year 2012. Over that same time period, the Courts of Appeals’ case dispositions have decreased by 7.4 percent and pending caseloads have also been decreasing by approximately 16 percent. This correlates with aggregate clearance rate data for the 14 Courts of Appeals showing that more cases were disposed than added each fiscal year since fiscal year 2013. A clearance rate measures the number of cases disposed as a percentage of filings during a reporting period. A clearance rate of 100 percent indicates that the court disposed of the same number of cases during the year as were added, resulting in no change to the court’s case backlog. Average time to disposition amongst the 14 Courts of Appeals remained steady over this same time period.

- In addition, the Courts of Appeals have seen increases among the following types of cases:
- Pro se litigant cases; cases where a person represents himself or herself in court;
 - A 47 percent increase since fiscal year 2007 in accelerated cases that statute requires be resolved within 6 months. This caseload represented 25 percent of the 9,333 new cases filed in fiscal year 2016;
 - A 202 percent increase since fiscal year 2007 in parental termination cases with an expedited appeal that statute requires be resolved within 6 months; and
 - The number of petitions for a Writ of Mandamus; these writs are orders from a superior court to a lower court commanding that court or official perform or refrain from a specific act.

3. **Judicial Compensation Commission:** The Judicial Compensation Commission is recommending a 10.2 percent increase in judicial salaries for the 2018–19 biennium. This would increase the state salary of a Court of Appeals Justice from \$154,000 to \$169,708 and a Chief Justice of a Court of Appeals from \$156,500 to \$172,208. The most recent judicial salary adjustment was a 12 percent increase in the 2014–15 biennium for judge and prosecutor positions linked to district judge pay totaling \$34.8 million across the 2014–15 biennium.

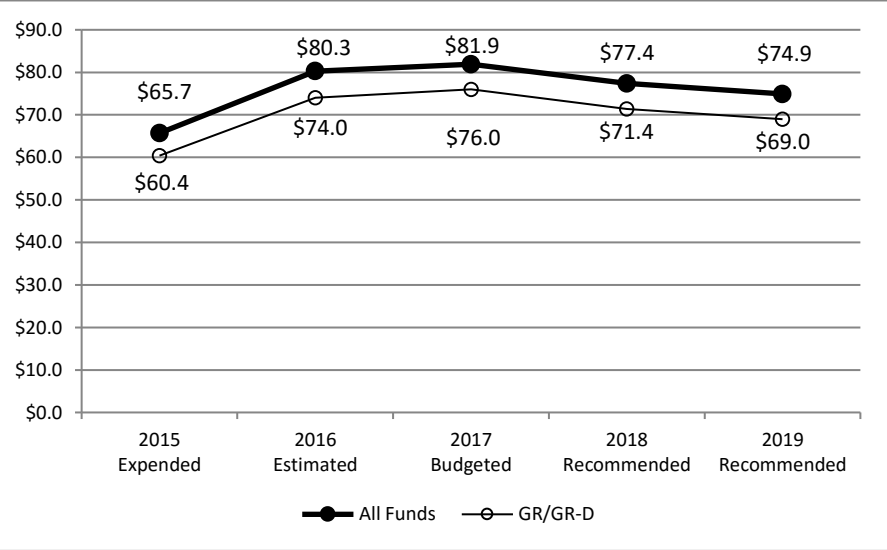

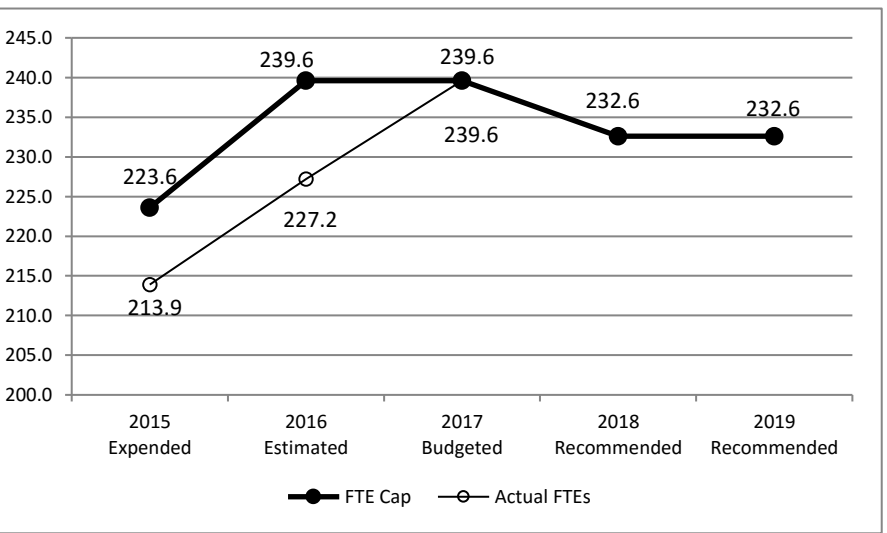

Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - House**

1. The Legislative Appropriations Request submitted reflects the appropriations requests of both the Office of Court Administration (OCA), Texas Judicial Council (OCA and TJC respectively), and the Texas Indigent Defense Commission (TIDC). TIDC is a standing committee of the Texas Judicial Council, and is administratively attached to the Office of Court Administration.
2. **Electronic Case Filing Funding.** Recommendations provide \$22.4 million each year for management of the e-filing system and remove the estimated appropriation authority for these funds. This includes a decrease of \$788,018 in General Revenue-Dedicated Statewide Electronic Filing System Account No. 5157 funding from 2016–17 levels submitted in the agency's 4 percent reduction. OCA uses these funds to pay a vendor, Tyler Technologies, to manage the e-filing system and to assist courts in implementing mandated electronic filing. The agency has reported that this reduction will not impact the contracts with the vendor. The Comptroller's Biennial Revenue Estimate (BRE) anticipates revenue collections of \$44.5 million for the 2018–19 biennium in addition to remaining available balances of \$5.2 million at the end of fiscal year 2017. This will result in a \$5.0 million balance being available for appropriation.

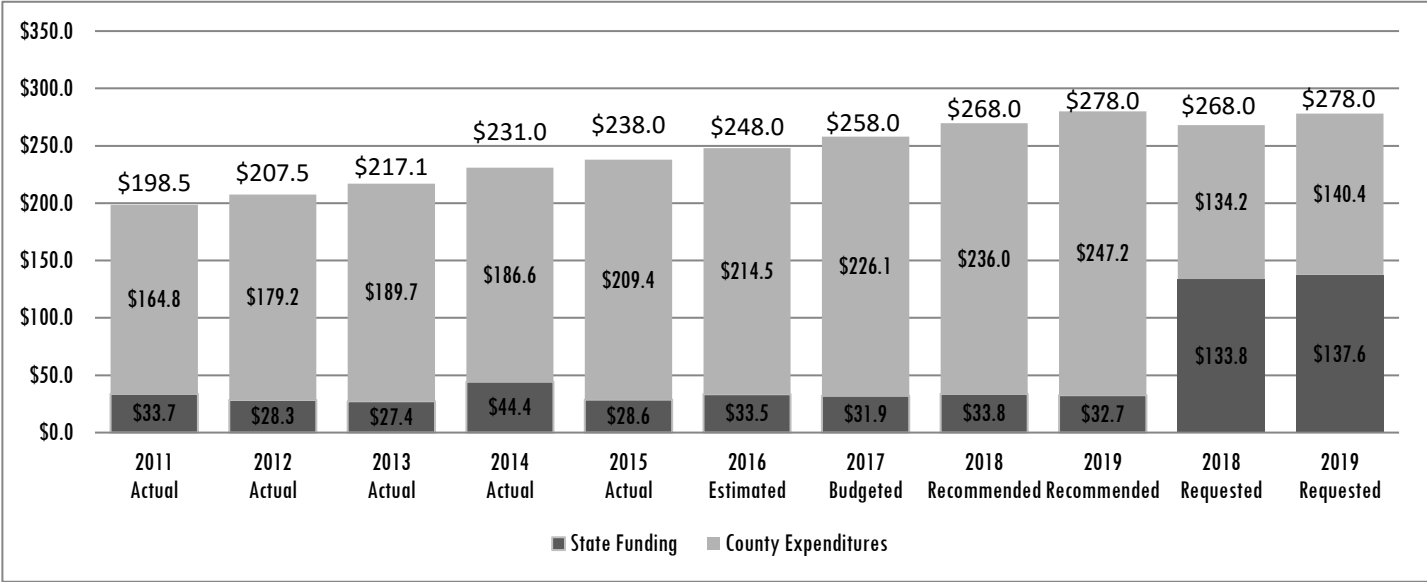
The enactment of Senate Bill 1139, Eighty-fourth Legislature, Regular Session, increased the filing fee for civil cases in county-level, district, and appellate courts from \$20 to \$30 to compensate for reductions in e-filing revenues during the 2014–15 biennium (See also, Rider Highlights – House #15 and Items Not Included in Recommendations for OCA – House #6).

3. **Timothy Cole Exoneration Review Commission:** Recommendations do not include \$245,304 in General Revenue funding with 2.0 FTEs for the Timothy Cole Exoneration Review Commission to examine cases in Texas in which an innocent defendant was convicted and subsequently exonerated after January 1, 2010. The Commission, which was established with the enactment of HB 48, Eighty-fourth Legislature, Regular Session, is required to submit a report by December 1, 2016 on its work and will be abolished upon the earlier of either the date the Commission submits its report, or December 1, 2016.
4. **CAPPS Deployment:** Recommendations do not include \$803,438 in General Revenue with 2.0 FTEs each year for Centralized Accounting and Payroll/Personnel System (CAPPS) deployment for OCA to assist courts and judicial agencies in the transition. 2016–17 funding provided for a project manager and a management analyst to oversee the support, which began in fiscal year 2016. The agency submitted \$431,624 from this funding in its 4 percent reduction and requested to retain the remaining amount of \$371,814 in 2018-19 to complete the full deployment among the courts and judicial agencies, which the recommendations remove.
5. **Guardianship Compliance Project:** Recommendations remove one-time funding of \$590,881 in General Revenue with 3.0 FTEs each year for the Guardianship Compliance Pilot Project to review adult guardianship cases to identify reporting deficiencies by the guardian, audit annual accountings and report findings back to the judge, and work with courts to develop best practices in managing guardianship cases. Funding provided for the 2016–17 biennium pilot project was used to review 10,325 guardianship files from 18 courts in 11 counties. Project findings include a recommendation to close 76 percent of the reviewed cases that were not active and a determination that 43 percent of filings were out of compliance with at least one element of statutorily required reporting. OCA submitted a performance report on the pilot project in December, 2016 (See Also, Rider Highlights – House #20 and Items Not Included in Recommendations for OCA – House #2).
6. **Children's Courts:** Recommendations include \$5.4 million in General Revenue funding and \$10.5 million in Interagency Contracts for 43 Child Support Courts and \$8.8 million in General Revenue funding for 24 Child Protection Courts. OCA has identified a potential conflict of interest between these courts and the Office of Attorney General (OAG) due to the OAG providing information technology support to these courts while, at the same time, being a party to the cases heard in these courts (See also, Items Not Included in Recommendations for OCA – House #3 and Rider Highlights – House #17).
7. **Executive Director Salary** Section 8, Schedule of Exempt Positions, Special Provisions – Judiciary, provides the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the authority to set the rate of compensation for the Administrative Director in an amount not to exceed the maximum salary of the salary group listed for this position in OCA's bill pattern. The Chief Justice last increased the salary for the Administrative Director to \$167,040 effective September 1, 2015. The State Auditor's Classification Office recommended in August, 2016, that the Group for the Administrative Director position be increased from Group 4 to Group 5 (See also, Items Not Included in Recommendations for OCA – House #4).

8. **Fair Defense Account:** Appropriations from the General Revenue-Dedicated Fair Defense Account No. 5073 fund the operations of both the Office of Capital and Forensic Writs (OCFW) and the Texas Indigent Defense Commission (TIDC) in addition to the grants provided to the counties discussed in Item 9 below. Anticipated costs from this account total \$62.8 million, which includes recommended appropriations of \$61.7 million (\$31.4 million in fiscal year 2018 and \$30.3 million in fiscal year 2019) to OCFW and TIDC for these purposes and benefit costs of \$1.1 million. Anticipated revenues and available fund balances of \$68.5 million exceed total costs by \$5.7 million, which are also available for appropriation. Revenues deposited to this account are primarily generated from 8.0143 percent of the total collections received through the Consolidated Court Cost that is paid by defendants convicted under certain sections of the Penal Code.

Recommendations for TIDC include \$59.0 million in General Revenue–Dedicated Fair Defense Account No. 5073 funding which is \$5.2 million below 2016–17 spending levels. This decrease includes \$2.8 million for amounts that TIDC submitted in its 4 percent reduction and \$2.4 due to an agency-anticipated 2.0 percent decrease in Court Cost revenue each year of the 2018–19 biennium. Recommendations also remove estimated appropriation authority from these funds. Recommendations continue the Commission’s administrative allocation at 2016–17 levels (See also, Items Not Included in Recommendations for TIDC – House #1 and #4, and Rider Highlights – House #8).

9. **County and State Share of Indigent Defense Costs:** The costs to provide indigent defense services are met through a combination of state and local funding, with counties absorbing a majority of these costs. Recommendations include \$66.5 million from General Revenue and General Revenue–Dedicated Fair Defense Account No. 5073 funding, but do not include a TIDC request for estimated appropriation authority to the account nor a request for \$103.6 million in fiscal year 2018 and \$108.6 million in fiscal year 2019 in General Revenue to defray county court costs of providing mandatory indigent defense services. The chart below shows a breakdown of indigent defense expended and budgeted spending from fiscal years 2011 through 2017 with projections for each year of the 2018–19 biennium. TIDC’s request for the 2018–19 biennium would result in an approximately 50 percent state/county split in the share of indigent defense costs with the state absorbing \$134 million in fiscal year 2018 and \$138 million in fiscal year 2019 (See also, Rider Highlights – House #8 and Items Not Included in Recommendations for TIDC – House #4).

10. **Regional Public Defender Office for Capital Cases:** Recommendations continue \$3.1 million in General Revenue for the Regional Public Defender Office for Capital Cases (RPDO) that covers approximately 24 percent of program costs. The RPDO includes 179 participating counties that pay membership dues in exchange for the RPDO to have a qualified defense team provided by the program at no additional cost when a member county has a capital murder case (See also, Items Not Included in Recommendations for TIDC – House #2 and Rider Highlights – House #18).

8. **Texas Indigent Defense Commission:** Recommendations update the rider to require appropriations to be for all uses authorized by TIDC's enabling statute, Government Code, Chapter 79, and remove estimated appropriation authority for the General Revenue–Dedicated Fair Defense Account No. 5073. Amounts provided from General Revenue–Dedicated Fair Defense Account No. 5073 are sum-certain in Strategy D.1.1, Texas Indigent Defense Commission (See also, Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - House #8 and #9, and Items Not Included in Recommendations for TIDC – House #1 and #4)
11. **Innocence Projects:** Recommendations update the rider to correctly identify the total amount allocated to the six law schools following the addition of two universities by the 84th Legislature, an increase from \$400,000 to \$600,000, and require higher education institutions receiving grant funds from TIDC for innocence projects to use these funds to provide direct assistance to investigate and pursue relief for defendants with claims of actual innocence.
16. **Mileage Reimbursement for Children's Court Staff:** Recommendations update the rider to reference the new title for the agency's Child Support and Child Protection Courts that has replaced the agency's previous title, Specialty Courts.
18. **Regional Public Defender Office for Capital Cases:** Recommendations update the rider to reflect a program title change (See also, Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues - House #10 and Items Not Included in Recommendations for TIDC – House #2)

12. **Lump Sum Payments for Child Support Courts Program:** Recommendations delete the rider. Recommendations continue funding for this purpose in Strategy B.1.1, Child Support Courts Program. The agency reports making payments for this purpose consistently above amounts included in the rider
14. **Contingency: Study of School Attendance Related Cases:** Recommendations delete the rider because enactment of House Bill 2398, Eighty-fourth Legislature, Regular Session repealed the law making failure to attend school a criminal offense and eliminated the need for the study.
15. **Statewide Efiling System Fund:** Recommendations delete the rider. Amounts provided from General Revenue–Dedicated Statewide Electronic Filing System Account No. 5157 are sum-certain in Strategy B.1.2, Information Technology (See also, Selected Fiscal and Policy Issues – House #2 and Items Not Included in Recommendations for OCA – House #6).
17. **Additional Child Protection Courts:** Recommendations delete the rider. Recommendations continue funding for this purpose in Strategy B.1.2, Child Protection Courts Program.
19. **Contingency for SB 1970:** Recommendations delete the rider. 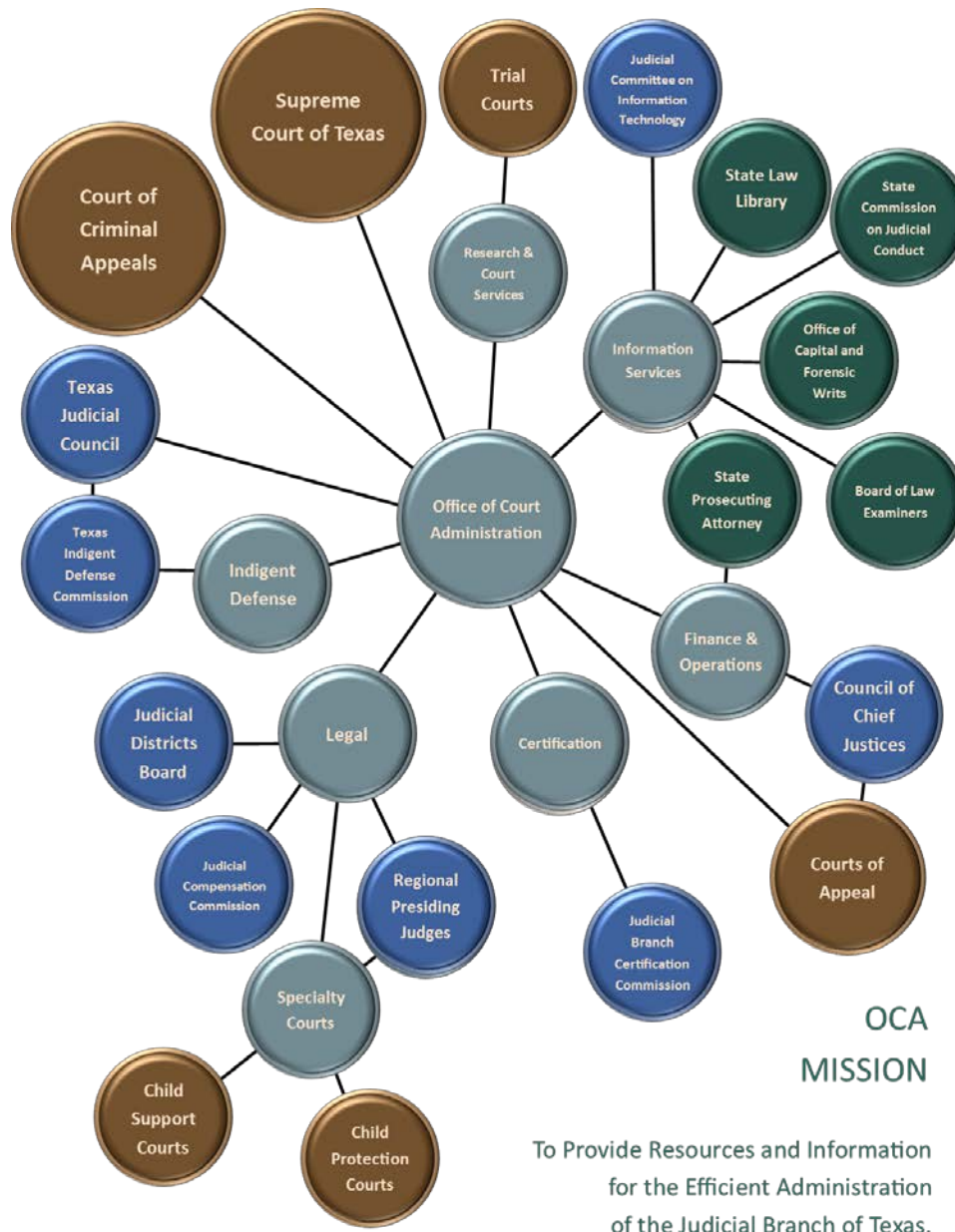

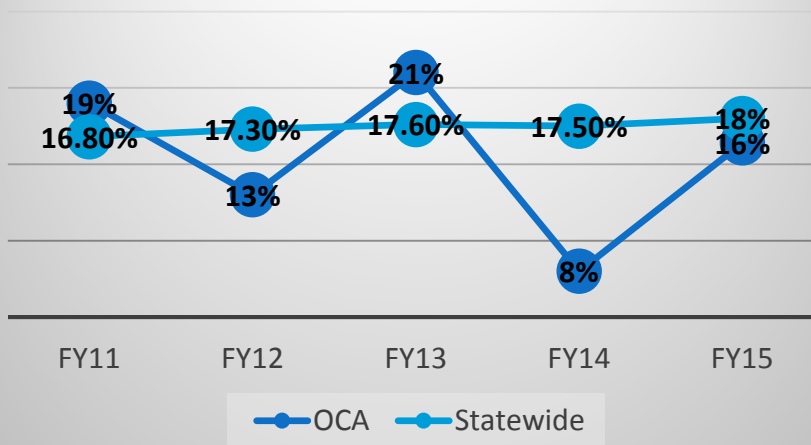
OCA Employee Salary Data

Turnover (Excluding Children's Courts)



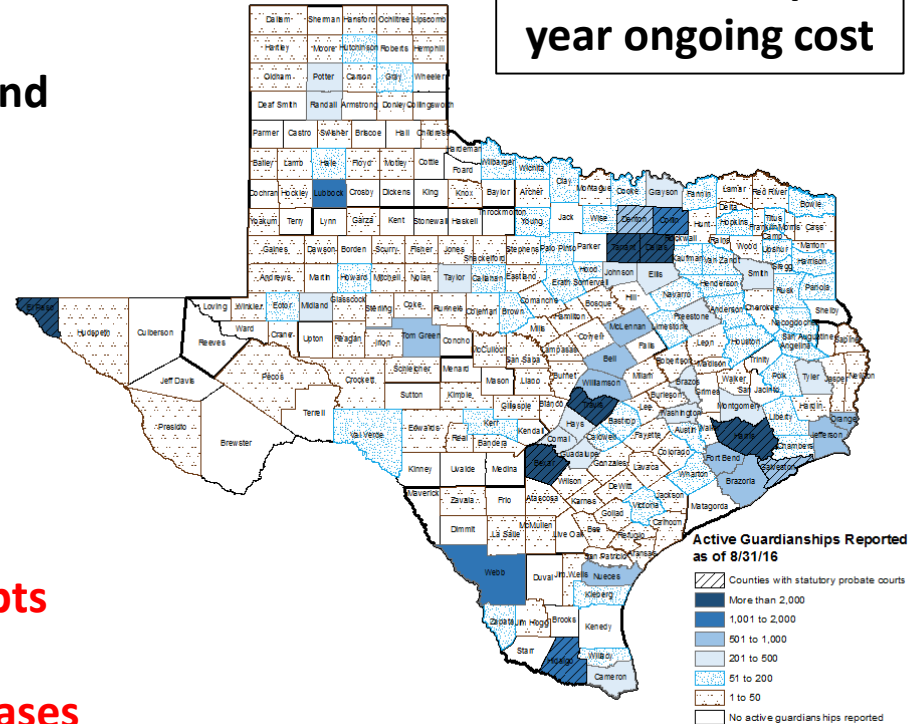

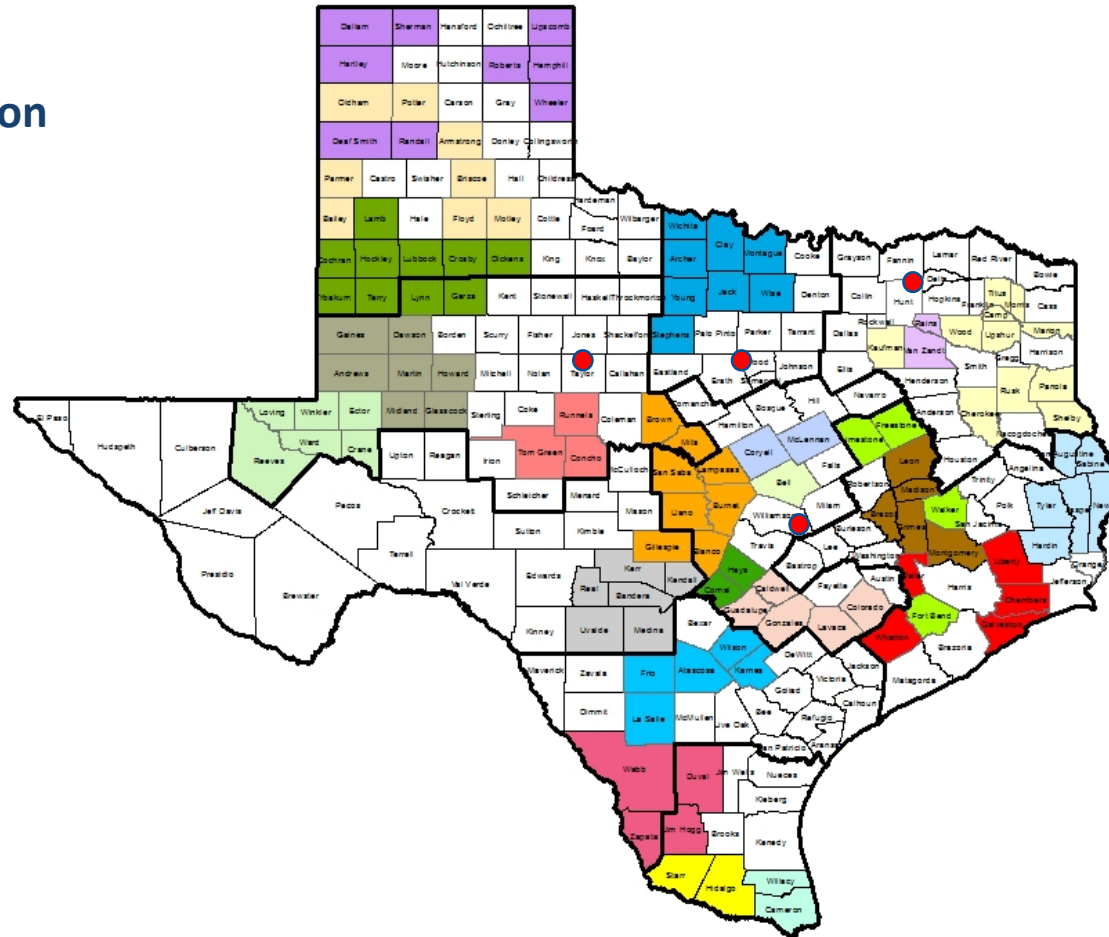

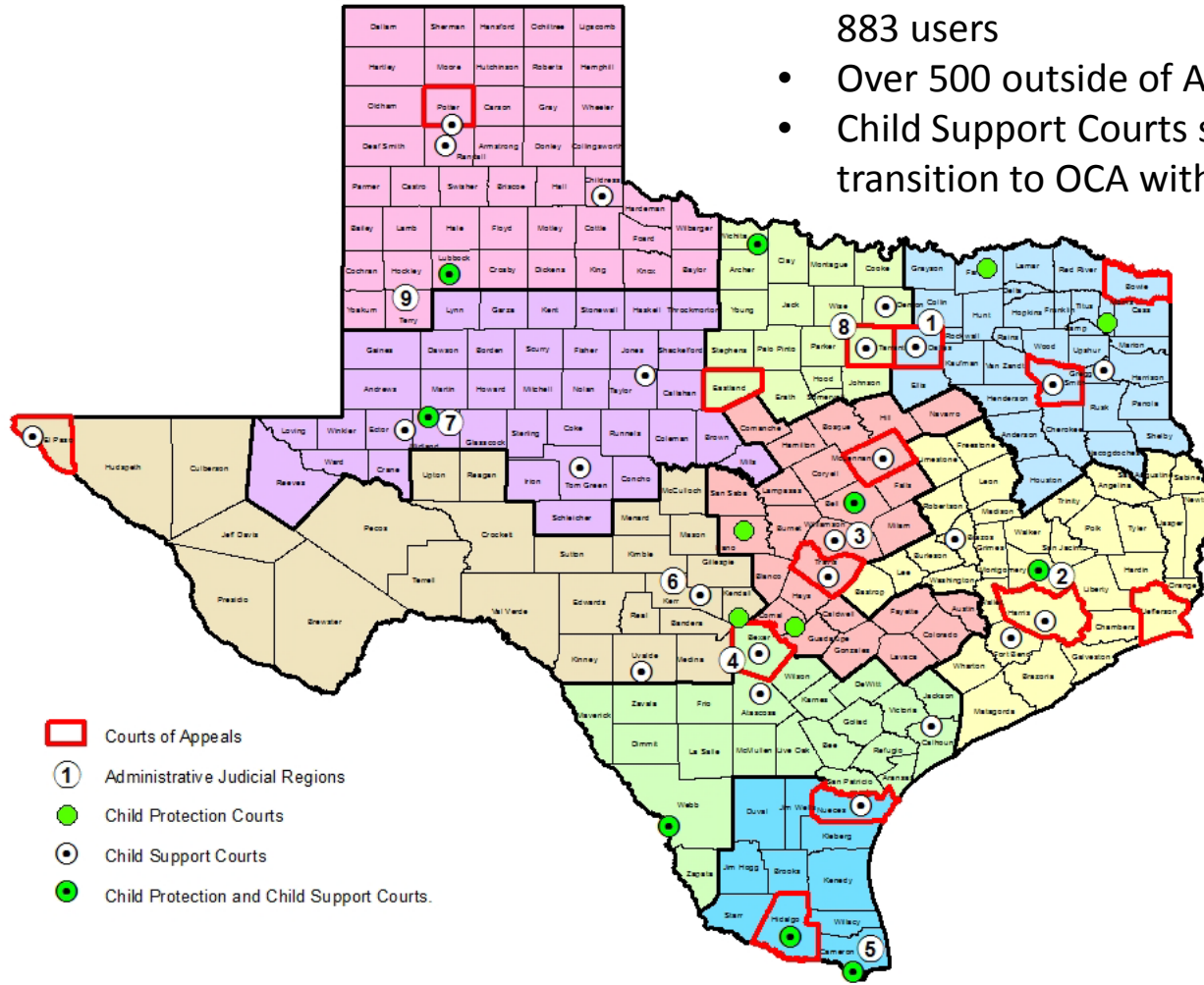


Final locations to be determined by Regional Presiding Judges based upon caseload and need

Exceptional Item 4

OCA has only one exempt position, the Administrative Director, currently a Group 4 position. While no funding is being requested, OCA requests that the Administrative Director exempt position be increased to a Group 5 position. This change corresponds with the August 2016 recommendation of the State Auditor to move the Administrative Director position to Group 5.

GUARDIANSHIP COMPLIANCE PROJECT

Guardianship is a legal process appointing a competent adult (guardian) to be responsible for the care, custody and control for a vulnerable or incapacitated person often referred to as a ward. Appointed guardians make final decisions regarding a ward's finances, medical decisions, living situation, right to marry, and right to drive.

Guardians are required by law to file with the court for the court's approval:

- **A bond to cover one year of revenue to the estate, plus the value of the ward's personal property (within 21 days)**
- **An initial inventory detailing the assets in the estate (within 30 days)**
- **An annual report of the ward's well-being**
- **An annual accounting detailing financial transactions of the estate**

OCA obtained funding during the 84th legislative session to establish a pilot program to improve guardianship compliance. OCA launched the Guardianship Compliance Project in November 2015 to provide additional resources to courts handling guardianship cases. The goal of this project is to help courts protect our most vulnerable citizens and their assets by:

- Reviewing adult guardianship cases to identify reporting deficiencies by the guardian
- Auditing annual accountings and reporting findings back to the court
- Working with courts to develop best practices in managing guardianship cases

Why is this important?

The population of **Texans over age 65 is projected to double** in size by 2030 to almost 6 million. Some of those individuals will need guardianships as they become unable to make decisions for themselves.

It is estimated that there is currently **\$5 billion in assets under court and guardian control in Texas**. Without sound monitoring practices by courts, there is a high risk for exploitation and/or neglect.

Statutory probate courts are located in 10 of the state's 15 largest metropolitan areas. In Texas' remaining 244 counties, probate matters, including guardianship cases are either handled by the county judge or county court at law judge without sufficient resources to monitor cases.

Over 20,300 of the state's 54,647 active guardianships reside in counties that lack resources to closely monitor these important cases.

What We Do

Our Mission

Provide financial and technical support to counties to develop and maintain quality, cost-effective indigent defense systems that meet the needs of local communities and the requirements of the Constitution and state law.

Our Grant Program

In FY 2016, \$31.6 million was disbursed to Texas counties.

Formula grants totaled \$25.1 million to 254 counties.

Discretionary grants totaled \$6.5 million to 17 counties.

Our Fiscal and Policy Monitoring Program

The Commission monitors each county that receives a grant to ensure state money is being properly spent and accounted for and to enforce compliance by the county with the conditions of the grant, as well as with state and local rules and regulations.

Our Innocence Program

Since 2005, the Commission has provided up to \$100,000 annually to the University of Texas School of Law, the Texas Tech University School of Law, the Thurgood Marshall School of Law at Texas Southern University, and the University of Houston Law Center to operate innocence clinics. This funding has contributed towards 15 exonerations. In 2015 the 84th Legislature expanded funding to include \$100,000 per year for two new public law schools at the University of North Texas Dallas College of Law and the Texas A&M University School of Law in Fort Worth.

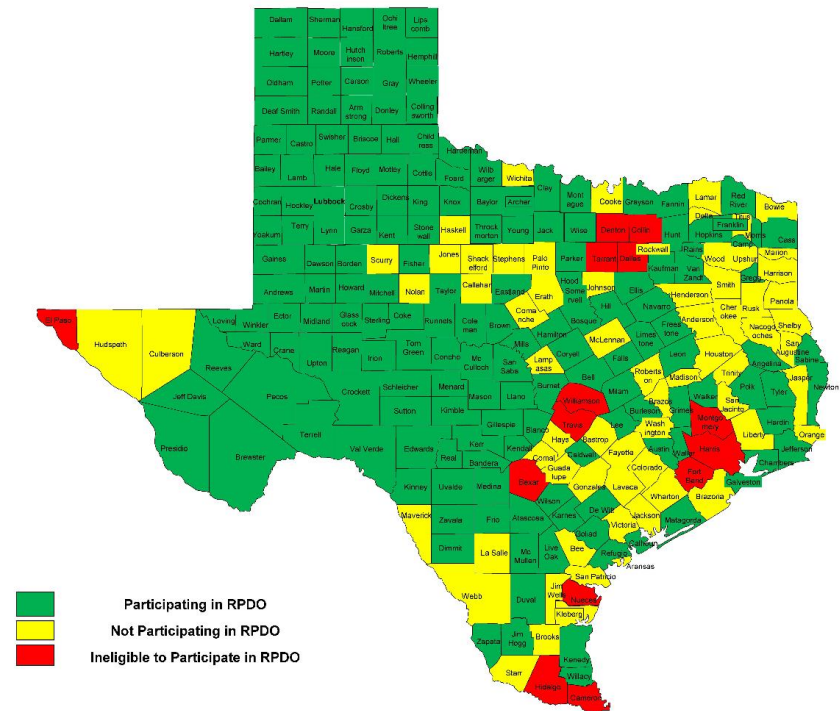

Mental Health Specialized Defender Models



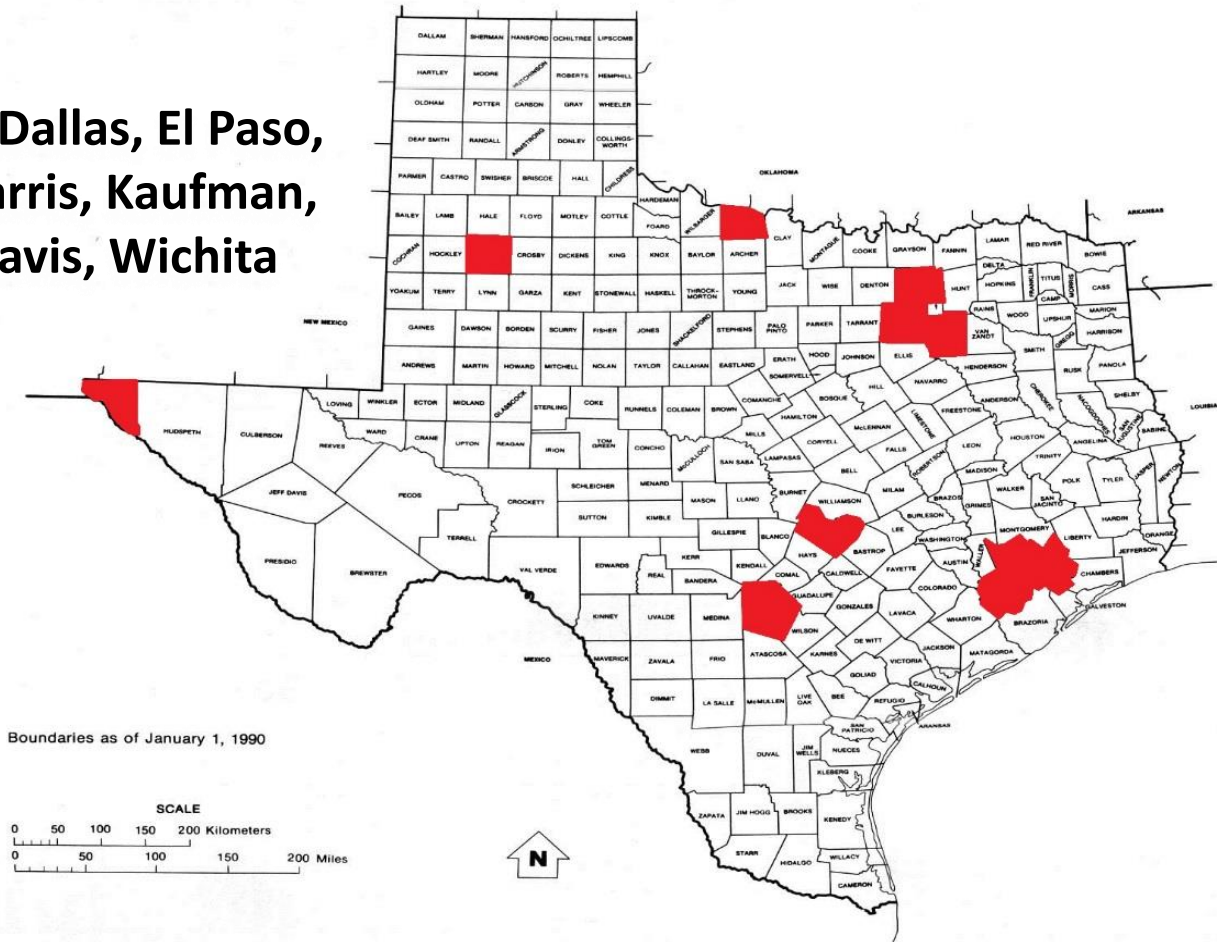
Public Defender (PD)

In each model, specialized counsel coordinate with social and case workers to represent defendants with mental illness. Programs link defendants with treatment and resources to help stabilize them and address the behaviors that lead defendants into the criminal justice system.

Unmet Mental Health Needs are a Major Cost Driver in the Criminal Justice System

- TIDC estimates that approximately 95,000 persons annually have mental health issues and need appointed counsel in Texas. Programs currently meet only 9% of the need for specialized counsel.
- Approximately 14,000 persons are “super-utilizers” who are deeply involved in the criminal justice system, resulting in \$650 million in local jail costs each year due to **mental illness and substance abuse.** (Andy Keller, *Texas Judicial Council Mental Health Committee Briefing: Texas Mental Health Needs, Systems, and Legislative Issues*, July 1, 2016)



These Programs Produce Better Outcomes for Defendants and Cost Savings for the County

The Collin County MHMAC saved the county over \$640,000 in 2015 by increasing the use of personal bonds and reducing the number of jail bed days utilized for competency restoration.

The Fort Bend County MHPD cut client jail bed days in half, saving the county \$2,500 per misdemeanor and \$7,000 per felony case.

The Wichita County PD Mental Health Case Worker saved the county over \$93,000 from 2015-16 by cutting jail bed days, reducing the use of psychological evaluations, and assisting court-appointed attorneys with mental health record review.

Travis County MHPD clients had lower recidivism rates and faster case disposition than non-PD clients. Around 39% of MHPD clients were re-arrested within the year following case disposition, compared to 50% of non-PD clients. MHPD clients also resolved their cases 40 days faster than non-PD clients.

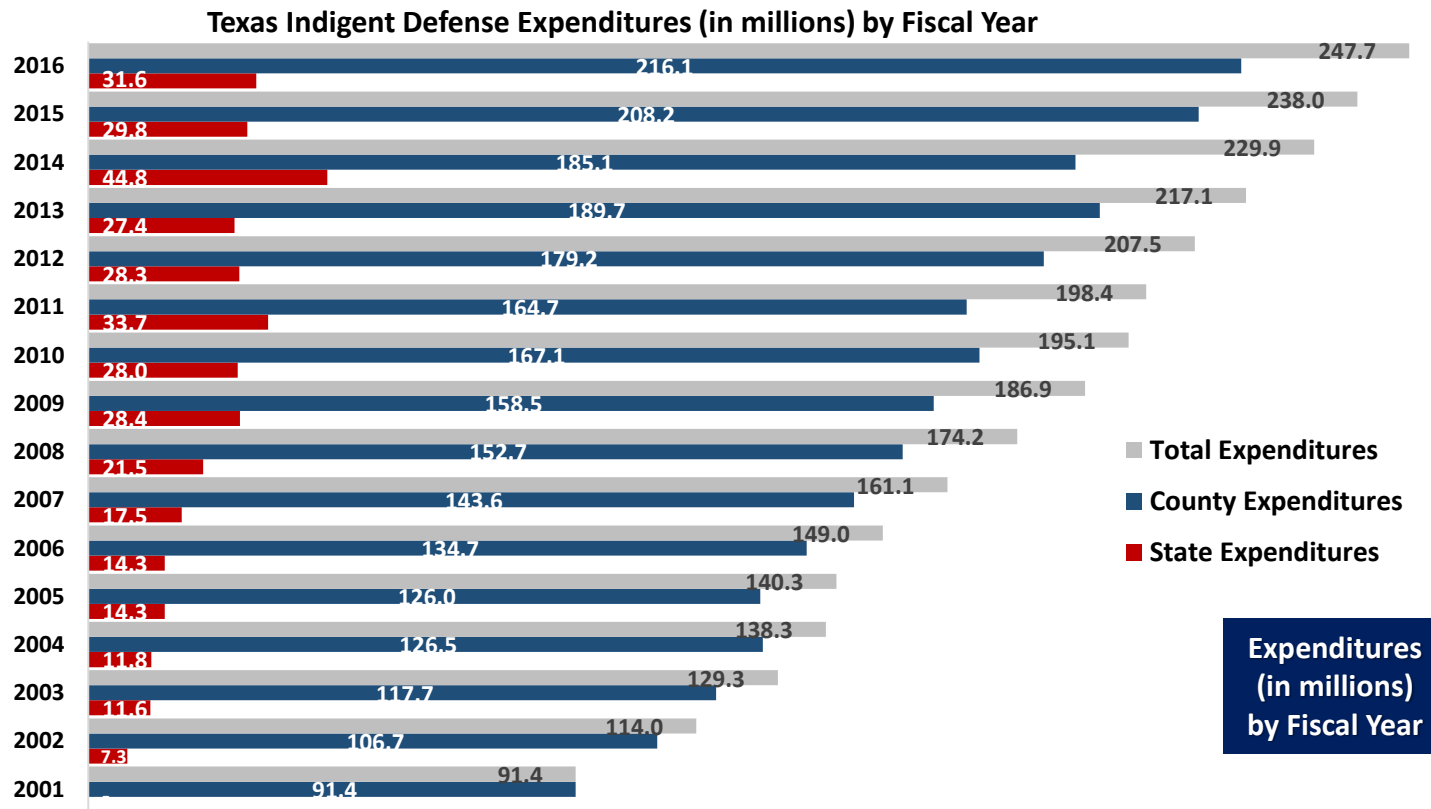
Harris County MHPD clients were five times more likely to receive a dismissal than similarly situated defendants.

Exceptional Item #4 - \$212 million

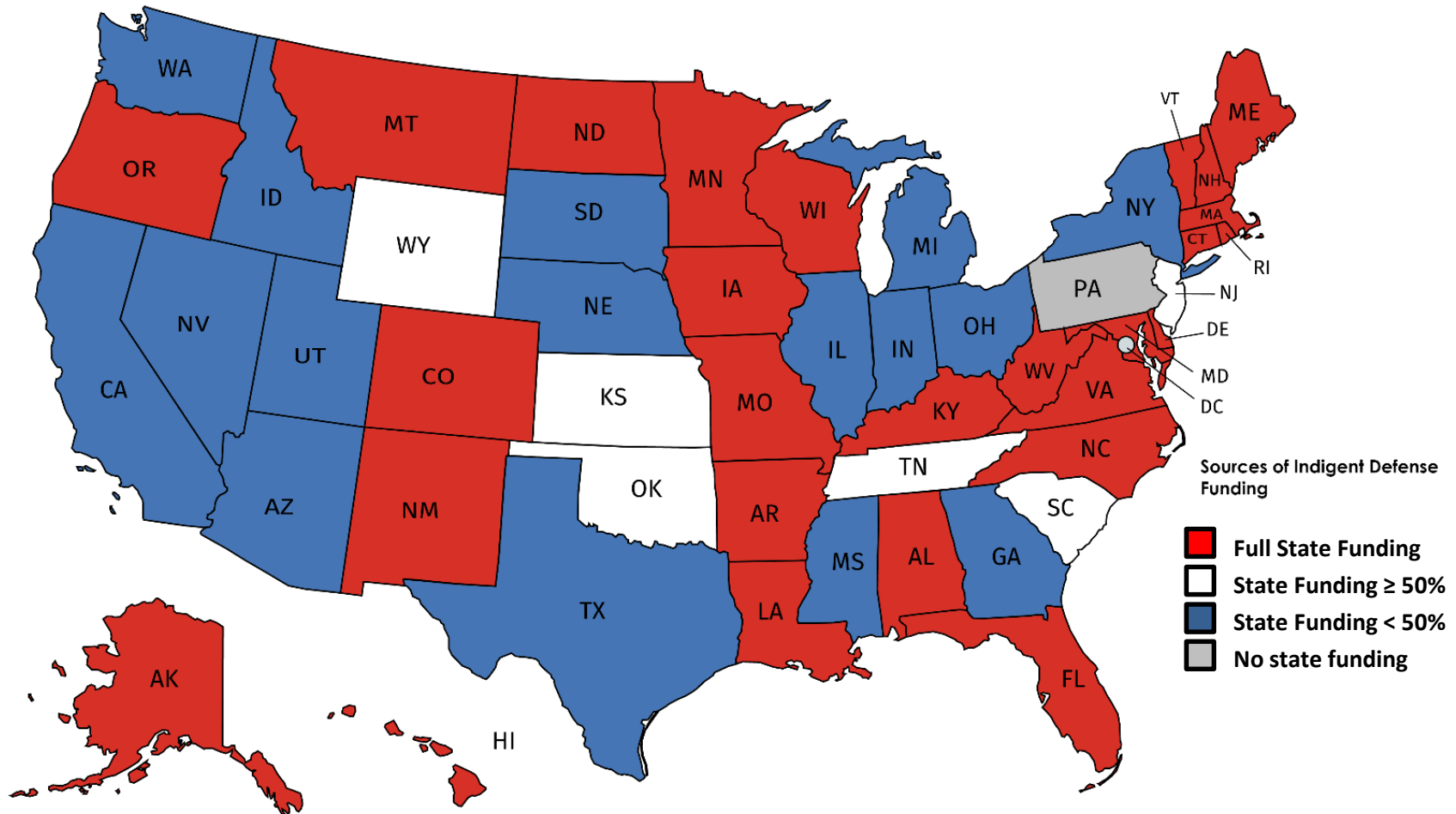
Request: Provide Local Property Tax Relief to Counties by Fully Funding Criminal Indigent Defense Costs

Impact:

- Assist Counties in meeting federal and state constitutional directive to provide and pay for criminal indigent defense services. Most states fully fund criminal indigent defense services.
- Help ensure that all Counties, regardless of tax base, are able to provide adequate and effective representation to those persons too poor to hire counsel.

Lawsuits Pending in Numerous States Over Inadequate Indigent Defense Systems
