A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

1-17 1-18 relating to the training of peace officers for family violence and sexual assault assignments. 1-19

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

1-20 SECTION 1. Section 1701.352(b), Occupations Code, is amended to read as follows: 1-21

1-22 1-23 (b) The commission shall require a state, county, special district, or municipal agency that appoints or employs peace officers to provide each peace officer with a training program at 1-24 1-25 least once every 48 months that is approved by the commission and 1-26 consists of: 1-27

topics selected by the agency; and (1)

(2) for an officer holding only a basic proficiency certificate, not more than 20 hours of education and training that 1-28 1-29 1-30 contain curricula incorporating the learning objectives developed 1-31 by the commission regarding:

1-32 (A) rights, civil racial sensitivity, and 1-33 cultural diversity;

1-34 (B) de-escalation and crisis intervention 1-35 techniques to facilitate interaction with persons with mental 1-36 impairments;

1-37 (C) de-escalation techniques to facilitate interaction with members of the public, including techniques for 1-38 limiting the use of force resulting in bodily injury; and 1-39

1-40 (D) unless determined by the agency head to be inconsistent with the officer's assigned duties: 1-41

(i) the recognition, [and] documentation, and investigation of cases that involve child abuse or neglect, 1-42 1-43 family violence, and sexual assault, including the use of best 1-44 1-45 practices and trauma-informed techniques to effectively recognize, document, and investigate those cases; and 1-46

(a) The commission by rule shall establish minimum requirements for the training, 1-52 1-53 1-54 testing, and certification of special officers for responding to 1-55 allegations of family violence or sexual assault.

(b) The commission may certify a peace officer as a special officer for responding to allegations of family violence or sexual 1-56 1-57 1-58 assault if the person:
