## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1-18 WHEREAS, Members of the Texas Geographic Names Committee and 1-19 the U.S. Board on Geographic Names have issued a report which shows 1-20 that there are at least 28 geographic features in Texas with 1-21 racially offensive names; and

1-22 WHEREAS, In 1991, the Texas Legislature passed H.B. 1756, 1-23 relating to the elimination of certain racially offensive names of 1-24 geographic features; the act requires the renaming of any 1-25 geographic feature with a name containing the word "Negro," yet in 1-26 the 30 years since the law was passed, 17 of the 19 place names 1-27 detailed in the act remain unchanged; and 1-28 WHEREAS, Changes to place names require the approval of the

1-28 WHEREAS, Changes to place names require the approval of the 1-29 U.S. Board on Geographic Names, which in 1998 rejected the names 1-30 proposed by H.B. 1756; however, the names were submitted for 1-31 reconsideration at a recent meeting of the USBGN and will be 1-32 considered for validation and acceptance no later than June 2021; 1-33 and

1-34 addition WHEREAS, In to those currently under reconsideration, the USBGN has identified 11 other place names in 1-35 Texas containing the slur, in contravention of Section 3 of H.B. 1-36 1756; there are currently no proposals to change these names, and the board's protocol requires a formal proposal be submitted in order to consider any changes; the board encourages Texas to seek 1-37 1-38 1-39 proponents to submit a proposal for each of these names; and 1-40

1-41 WHEREAS, The perpetuation of racially offensive language is a 1-42 stain on the Lone Star State, and it is vital that the names of these 1-43 geographic features be changed in order to reflect and honor the 1-44 diversity of the population; now, therefore, be it

1-45 RESOLVED, That the 87th Legislature of the State of Texas 1-46 hereby urge the U.S. Board on Geographic Names to approve requests 1-47 to change racially offensive place names in accordance with Texas 1-48 H.B. 1756.

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
